First Reading: Isaiah 40:1-11

"Comfort, O comfort my people," says your God. "Speak tenderly to Jerusalem, and cry to her that she has served her term, that her penalty is paid, that she has received from the Lord's hand double for all her sins." A voice cries out: "In the wilderness prepare the way of the Lord, make straight in the desert a highway for our God. Every valley shall be lifted up, and every mountain and hill be made low; the uneven ground shall become level, and the rough places a plain. Then the glory of the Lord shall be revealed, and all people shall see it together, for the mouth of the Lord has spoken." A voice says, "Cry out!' And I said, "What shall I cry?" All people are grass, their constancy is like the flower of the field. The grass withers, the flower fades, when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass. The grass withers, the flower fades; but the word of our God will stand forever. Get you up to a high mountain, O Zion, herald of good tidings; lift up; you voice with strength, O Jerusalem, herald of good tidings, lift it up, do not fear; say to the cities of Judah, "Here is your God!" See, the Lord God comes with might, and his arm rules for him; his reward is with him, and his recompense before him. He will feed his flock like a shepherd; he will gather the lambs in his arms, and carry them in his bosom, and gently lead the mother sheep.

The Lord is not slow about his promise, as some think of slowness, but is patient with you, not wanting any to perish, but all to come to repentance. But the day of the Lord will come like a thief, and then the heavens will pass away with a loud noise, and the elements will be dissolved with fire, and the earth and everything that is done on it will be disclosed. Since all these things are to be dissolved in this way, what sort of person ought you to be in leading lives of holiness and godliness, waiting for and hastening the coming of the day of God, because of which the heavens will be set ablaze and dissolved, and the elements will melt with fire? But, in accordance with his promise, we wait for new heavens and a new earth, where righteousness is at home. Therefore, beloved, while you are waiting for these things, strive to be found by him at peace, without spot or blemish, and regard the patience of our Lord as salvation.

Gospel: Mark 1:1-8

The beginning of the good news of Jesus Christ, the Son of God. As it is written in the prophet Isaiah, "See, I am sending my messenger ahead of you, who will prepare your way; the voice of one crying out in the wilderness: 'Prepare the way of the Lord, make his paths straight.'" John the baptizer appeared in the wilderness, proclaiming a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins. And people from the whole Judean countryside and all the people of Jerusalem were going out to him, and were baptized by him in the river Jordan, confessing their sins. Now John was clothed with camel's hair, with a leather belt around his waist, and he ate locusts and wild honey. He proclaimed, "The one who is more powerful than I is coming after me; I am not worthy to stoop down and untie the thong of his sandals. Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins on the 2nd Sunday of Advent, December 10, 2023, at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland.

One of the things that church-goers do really well is potluck suppers. You all, we all, certainly fit this description. If there was a potluck supper contest, I am certain that we would be in line for a ribbon. Maybe even a blue ribbon.

Now, when we think about a potluck supper, we focus on what's on the table. It's go time. But this morning I would like us to consider an earlier step in the potluck supper process. Not what appears on the table, ready to eat. But the moment we decided what to bring, what to contribute. What went into that decision?

Isn't the biggest factor in that decision what we do well? We don't agree to contribute something we don't do well. What will people think? We'll be the talk of the whole Island. "Did you have any of that stuff that ______ (fill the blank with your name) contributed?"

No, we offer to bring what we do best. And often it's the same thing year after year. And others look forward to that consistency. "I sure hope ______ (fill the blank with someone else's name) brings that peach pie or meatloaf or coleslaw."

Well, you say, what does this have to do with today's lessons. Funny you should ask. Here you go. From the Gospel of Mark: "See, I am sending my messenger, John, ahead of you, who will proclaim a baptism for the repentance of sins."

Now, why do you suppose God picked John to execute this important task? After all, John was a strange duck. He was clothed with camel's hair, had a leather belt around his waist, and ate locusts and wild honey. Well, maybe, just maybe, God chose John because John didn't proclaim himself. Rather he proclaimed Jesus. In other words, John was modest. He saw himself not as the message, but the messenger. Not "Let me tell you about myself." But "Let me tell you about Jesus."

Back to the potluck supper. When we contribute a dish to a potluck supper, we do so with a mix of pride and modesty. We're proud to be asked to contribute, but we're probably not looking for a blue ribbon. Rather, we're happy simply to

contribute what we do well. In other words, our best. If we get a ribbon for our best, terrific. But, if not, we are pleased to have contributed our best.

In John's case, he was honored to have been asked to proclaim this message: "The One who can really make a difference in your life is Jesus of Nazareth." John was a spokesperson. He was an agent for Christ. He was a happy camper, not because of his wardrobe, but because he was in a new relationship with the Messiah. Like many others, John had been waiting for the Messiah. And here, he, the Messiah was. And not here casually, but here to ask a favor, namely to solicit John to proclaim the arrival of Jesus.

Jesus said to John, "I want <u>you</u> to tell people about <u>my arrival</u>." To which John might well have answered "Who? Me?" "Yes, John, <u>you</u>. I want <u>you</u> to help me. Share <u>your</u> experience, <u>your</u> conviction, <u>your</u> sense of being with whom <u>you</u> are meant to be."

Back to the potluck. John's contribution was Jesus. This was what Jesus <u>wanted</u> John to contribute. <u>And John did so</u>. And the news of this remarkable dish began to spread. Even making it to an Island on the Chesapeake on the other side of the world. What a journey. What a blessing. "I have baptized you with water; but he, Jesus, will baptize you with the Holy Spirit." And your life won't be the same. You will be filled with, The Spirit, for a lifetime and beyond.

And, here we are. Happy campers in a very challenging world. It's quite a Story. And it's our Story too. John the Baptist wasn't the only person asked to proclaim Jesus as the Messiah. The Messiah himself asked <u>you and me</u>. We can't remember exactly when the Ask took place. But that it took place is not in doubt. After all, we're here, with one another. Different experiences, but basically the same result.

And with the same expectation to share the Good News that <u>we have</u>

<u>experienced</u> and continue to experience. Isn't it very satisfying to arrive at a
potluck supper with our contribution, and then, at the end of the supper, see our
dish empty and people asking for the recipe?

Okay, you say. Enough of the potluck supper analogy? No, I take that back. Just one more thing.

You know, of course, that John the Baptist wasn't the only one at God's potluck. Look at today's lessons. Isaiah was there. The Psalmist was there. Peter was there also. Isaiah brought comfort food. The Psalmist brought poetry: "Mercy and truth have met together." Peter brought "patience."

And guess what. The potluck supper is still going on. And we're there. And we shouldn't underestimate the importance of our individual contributions to the Potluck. "The gifts of God for the people of God." We received the gift of faith. And now we're sharing the gift.

Maybe the name is confusing. Potluck sounds "iffy," doesn't it? As in "We're not sure, but we'll give it a try." Well, we have given it a try, and we're back for more. Both to receive and to share. Yes, for ourselves, but also for others. And, at the end of each supper, silently <u>and</u> sometimes aloud, we say "Thank you, Jesus. We'll be back with something special to share. You shared your life for us. The least we can do to say thank you is to contribute our lives to others.

Thank you, Lord. Amen.
