Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, Transfiguration, August 6, 2023.

Have you ever had a mountain top experience that changed you? Moses had one. On Mount Sinai, Moses talked with God. The encounter was so special that "the skin on the face of Moses was shining." **(Exodus 34:29)** Others observed this condition. And though you and I weren't there when Moses came down from the mountain, we read about the experience and continue to wonder about it.

Does the experience of Moses mirror our experience? Probably not, but maybe I'm speaking just for myself. But, even if we haven't had a comparable mountain top experience, have we had an experience that we couldn't explain? I suspect here the answer is "yes."

And, if so, how did we respond? Did we share the experience to test it? Or did we keep it to ourselves, mindful that others might wonder about us if we did share it? I suspect that we kept the experience to ourselves. It's who we are. We might do a lot of sharing in other realms, but not in religion.

But, even if we don't share, we do wonder, don't we? And that is not an accident. Again, curiosity is part of who we are. We wonder about all sorts of things, including whether there is a God or not.

Where does this curiosity come from? For us, in this setting, curiosity is a gift, that, if exercised, puts us in touch with our Creator. Not Mom and Dad. But the Big One, God Himself or Herself or Itself. Pick your pronoun. God answers to all, whatever the address.

One of the reasons we like Moses is because he gives us hope that we are not mere specs in the universe, but children of the Creator, a Creator who knows us one by one. This Moses assurance is the forerunner to the assurance that we recognize in Jesus. Jesus doesn't just represent God. He is God. God responds to our curiosity by becoming one of us. An absolutely brilliant move on the part of the Creator. Now, just to make clear, when we speak of The <u>Trans</u>-figuration, we are not speaking about the Creator changing from male to female or female to male. Rather, we are speaking theology, not biology.

No one knows for sure how things began or who or what began them and where things are headed and why. In the absence of certainty, we go with our best shot. And, for my money and yours – we're here together – Holy Scripture is a powerful source. It tells a spectacular tale, one that has been tested many times and never surpassed. Yes, we can quibble over details, but do we really want to quibble over whether there was Someone or Something who triggered the whole enterprise? I don't think so.

So let's start there and explore and, as possible, explain. If we're wrong, if we're off base, so be it. But in the meantime, let's do the best we can in understanding who and what and where we are, and go from there. That's what Scripture does. And besides, do we really want to give up potluck suppers in the parish hall. Of course, not. So, we continue on this Sunday with what we do know.

From today's Gospel **(Luke 9:33)**: "Peter said to Jesus, 'Master, it is good for us to be here.'" Yes, Peter, it <u>was</u> good and it <u>is</u> good. How does Peter thank the Lord? Well, he wants to erect three tents: one for Jesus, one for Moses, and one for Elijah. Why? We're not sure. Maybe it was expected hospitality. Maybe it was as simple as wanting to say thank you. And that's okay. That's what you and I do instinctively. "What can I do for you, Lord?" You need a tent? I'll get you a tent." Or, maybe, just maybe, Peter sensed that he might be in the company of the promised Messiah, and that anything Peter could do to honor the Messiah was appropriate and expected.

Good thinking on Peter's part. "Then from the cloud came a voice that said, 'This is my Son, my chosen; listen to him!'" **(Luke 9:35)** And Peter and James and John did just that. And what <u>was</u>/what <u>is</u> the result of that listening? Here we are, exploring how <u>we</u> can help the Lord. What can <u>we</u> do – as individuals and as a community – to make the Lord and the whole creation more comfortable? What are our options for welcoming the Lord?

We know the answer, don't we. Share the Lord. It's a pretty simple transaction. God loves us, and tells us, through Jesus, that if we want to thank the Lord for this profound love, we need to do something loving for others. That's our homework.

From today's epistle **(2 Peter 1:21)**, Peter reminds us of two critical components. "First of all, you must understand...." And second of all, you must share your understanding,

And, two thousand years later, we do so. Look at <u>your</u> record. You support organizations that help others. And you help others directly. You help neighbors and, yes, you help strangers. And, when you need help, it's there. It's community at its best.

And, here's the really important point. The more we help, the better we feel. There's a sense of doing what our Lord wants us to do and told us to do. We are fulfilling a calling. We are making the Lord's work <u>our work</u>. In a sense, we are transfigured. And we are proud of that and grateful for it.

And where do we express that pride and thanksgiving? Right here. We like being on the Lord's team. We like doing what we are meant to do. Things come together in really interesting and satisfying ways.

And that is no accident. It is rather the way things are meant to be. That feeling of being with the Lord, and yes, that feeling of being with one another. Certainly worth a thank-you gift of some sort. Maybe a dwelling. Maybe a tent. Maybe simply our very best effort.

Do you think that the Lord would be happy with a gift of our very best effort? Oh yes. I think the Lord would be, and is, very, very happy.

Lessons for The Transfiguration – August 6, 2023

First Reading: Exodus 34:29-35

Moses came down from Mount Sinai. As he came down from the mountain with the two tablets of the covenant in his hand, Moses did not know that the skin of his face shone because he had been talking with God. When Aaron and all the Israelites saw Moses, the skin of his face was shining, and they were afraid to come near him. But Moses called to them; and Aaron and all the leaders of the congregation returned to him, and Moses spoke with them. Afterward all the Israelites came near, and he gave them in commandment all that the Lord had spoken with him on Mount Sinai. When Moses had finished speaking with them, he put a veil on his face; but whenever Moses went in before the Lord to speak with him, he would take the veil off, until he came out; and when he came out, and told the Israelites what he had been commanded, the Israelites would see the face of Moses, that the skin of his face was shining; and Moses would put the veil on his face again, until he went into speak with him.

I think it right, as long as I am in this body, to refresh your memory, since I know that my death will come soon, as indeed our Lord Jesus Christ has made clear to me. And I will make every effort so that after my departure you may be able at any time to recall these things. For we did not follow cleverly devised myths when we made known to you the power and coming of our Lord Jesus Christ, but we had been eyewitnesses of his majesty. For he received honor and glory from God the Father when that voice was conveyed to him by the Majestic Glory, saying, "This is my Son, my Beloved, with whom I am well pleased." We ourselves heard this voice come from heaven, while were with him on the holy mountain. So we have the prophetic message more fully confirmed. You will do well to be attentive to this as to a lamp shining in a dark place, until the day dawns and the morning star rises in your hearts. First of all you must understand this, that no prophecy of scripture is a matter of one's own interpretation, because no prophecy ever came by human will, but men and women moved by the Holy Spirit spoke from God.

Gospel: Luke 9:28-36

Jesus took with him Peter and John and James, and went up on the mountain to pray. And while he was praying, the appearance of his face changed, and his clothes became dazzling white. Suddenly they saw two men, Moses and Elijah, talking to him. They appeared in glory and were speaking of his departure, which he was about to accomplish at Jerusalem. Now Peter and his companions were weighed down with sleep; but since they had stayed awake, they saw his glory and the two men who stood with him. Just as they were leaving him, Peter said to Jesus, "Master, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah" – not knowing what he said. While he was saying this, a cloud came and overshadowed them; and they were terrified as they entered the cloud. Then from the cloud came a voice that said, "This is my Son, my Chosen; listen to him!" When the voice had spoken, Jesus was found alone. And they kept silent and in those days told no one any of the things they had seen.
