Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 4th Sunday after Pentecost, June 25, 2023.

You know the phrase "tough to swallow." Well, there's no better illustration of this condition than today's lessons.

Our initial reaction is confusion. We're tempted to say "See you later, Jesus. You're supposed to be an 'upper.' And what do we get? A 'downer.' Life is too short to try to understand what you are thinking, what you are promising, what you want us to buy into. There's enough depression without adding to it. We'd rather ignore you than struggle to understand you."

Yet, here we are, trying to understand. Which suggests that "See you later" might be premature. Maybe we need to give Jesus some more time. Or maybe we need to give ourselves some more time.

Which, of course, is exactly what we are doing. We're here. Trying to understand this first century carpenter and what he might mean to us.

Clearly he means something to us. We responded to him because we were curious, and maybe even thankful. After all, Jesus offers himself as an answer to, or at least an indication of, the biggest question we all have. Which is "Where do I fit into this whole experience called life?"

We gather as curious people who want a satisfying life experience for ourselves and others. And the fact that we come together more than once – in many cases on a weekly basis – is a testament to our curiosity. We don't want to "swallow" a falsehood. We want to engage the Creator of the Universe, who has decided to engage us.

The Creator is not a neutral bystander. The Creator wants us to exercise our lives in thanksgiving and creativity and wonder. We don't want to be a "laughing stock." We want to be grateful servants of the Creator. And it is in and through the community we call the Church that we come as close to the One behind this whole enterprise called life.

Does God operate outside the institutional Church? Of course. But God also operates by design in and through the Church. There are hiccups to be sure. Some small, some huge. Some incidental. Some, sadly, intentional. Look at today's Psalm (Psalm 69:18). "Answer me, O Lord, for your love is kind. Save me from the mire; do not let me sink. Hide not your face from your servant. In your compassion, turn to me. And be swift, Lord, for I am in distress."

In his letter to the Romans (Romans 6:8), Paul underscores our longing for God's love and our belief in that love. "But if we have died with Christ, we believe that we will also live with him."

This level of conviction in the "Love of God in Christ Jesus" is not automatic. We have to work at it. In God's wisdom, we have been given the freedom to reject God. And, at times, rejection is tempting. But God is never far away. We might not feel the Lord hanging on to us, but that is in fact how the Lord spends most of His time. Hanging on to His, Her, Its – pick your pronoun – favorite creature. And who might that be? You and I. Believe it or not.

Well, in this place, this setting, we believe. Belief is shaky at times. Maybe absent at times. But never far away. And why? Because God hangs on. God won't let us go very far. We're on a pretty long leash, but a leash nonetheless. And thank God for that!

And let's give ourselves some credit. We hang on too. We stick with the Lord even when it seems that the Lord has forgotten us. We know that the Lord doesn't forget us, but that conviction is tested, especially when we face situations that we feel we don't deserve. "Where are you, Lord? You promised me."

Not a good thing to question the Lord, but sometimes we feel that way, don't we. And then we take a deep breath, say to the Lord "I'm sorry," and move on. The cross we dropped in disappointment, we pick up again in faith. We remember the assuring words of Jesus (Matthew 10:39): "Those who lose their life for my sake will find it."

The hymn we just sang – "Sing, my soul, his wondrous love" – is a great reminder of the benefits of sticking by the Lord through thick and thin. Here again are the last phrases of the four verses:

"still to us extends his grace"
"so much love to us below"
"guides us by his Spirit pure"
"trust his love for all to come"

"Trust his love." Trust. That's the key, isn't it? As God hangs in there with us, so we hang in there with God. And the remarkable thing is that, even when we don't hang in there with God, God still hangs in there with us. Everlasting love. No matter what.

Towards the back of the Book of Common Prayer (pp. 814 to 841) there is a wonderful collection of prayers and thanksgivings. We use these entries regularly in our Morning Prayer services. One of my favorites is "For Quiet Confidence."

O God of peace who hast taught us that in returning and rest we shall be saved, in quietness and in confidence shall be our strength: By the might of thy Spirit lift us, we pray thee, to thy presence, where we may be still and know that thou art God, through Jesus Christ our Lord.

Sometimes it's tough to lift ourselves to God's presence. Things seem to be working against us. It's the nature of life. It's the nature of free will. It's the nature of an imperfect world.

But we are not alone. Never. God is always present. God is always welcoming. It's our trust in that Divine nature that is shaky. That's the whole point of the Incarnation. God becomes one of us to remind us constantly of the Father's everlasting love. God simply doesn't give up on us.

The prophet Jeremiah understood this, well before Jesus arrived. "But the Lord is with me like a mighty warrior; therefore my persecutors will stumble, and they will not prevail." (Jeremiah 20:11)

That kind of an attitude, that trust in the Lord, even when we are confused, is what God wants for you and me. And when we forget that trust or put it aside or get angry with it, God's loving kindness does not waver. What a blessing!

Here's another of the collection of prayers mentioned earlier. This one is #38 on on page 827.

Almighty and everlasting God, you made the universe with all its marvelous order, its atoms, worlds, and galaxies, and the infinite complexity of living creatures: Grant that, as we probe the mysteries of your creation, we may come to know you more truly, and more surely fulfill our role in your eternal purpose; in the name of Jesus Christ our Lord.

Probing the mysteries of God's Creation, and our role in that Creation, is what we do here. We hang in there with God, grateful for God hanging in there for us. Not always easy, but well worth the effort. Well worth the **trust**. *Amen*.
