Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 12th Sunday after Pentecost, August 20, 2023.

There are times when, after reading or listening to scripture, we scratch our heads. Things don't make sense. Or so it seems. Today is a good example.

At the end of the passage from Paul's Letter to the Romans (Romans 11:1-2a, 29-32), he writes "For God has imprisoned all in disobedience so that he – God – may be merciful to all."

Does this mean that, when we disobey, we can blame God? Well, perhaps we can blame God for giving us the choice between obedience and disobedience. But isn't the decision that follows on us? If we obey, we can take credit. And if we disobey, we should own the decision. What's fair is fair.

The point is simply that God gives us the freedom to obey or disobey. And God does so because God wants us to be happy creatures. "I can do it myself, and I want to do it myself. And if I can act obediently in accordance with what God wants, that's when I am <u>really</u> happy."

If my <u>only</u> response is obedience – in other words, no choice on our part – what's there to be happy about? I want to <u>earn</u> the A. But, here we are in a setting, where we acknowledge that, by ourselves, we can't earn the A. We're not in charge of salvation. The Devil seems too strong.

But we don't give up, do we, just because we're not in charge. We're here, looking for clarification, for assurance. And where do we find that clarification and assurance? In Scripture, the very place that sometimes puzzles us.

One of the benefits of this era, our era, is that we have been exposed to the comedy of Laurel and Hardy. And one of the memorable lines from that duo is "This is a fine mess." And it's usually followed by "that you've gotten me into."

Now, sometimes you and I attribute the responsibility for this "fine mess" to God. After all, it is God who gives us the freedom to misuse freedom.

But, most of the time, we own the "fine mess," whatever it might be. We have taken a blessing of freedom, and exercised that blessing in a negative way. Not God's fault. Our fault. Or perhaps someone else's fault. But again, not God's fault.

Now, with whomever the fault lies – probably us - there is a lesson to be learned. Yes, we can, we should, learn from our mistakes. Not from God's mistakes, but ours. We own the "fine mess." Oliver Hardy was right. St. Paul was right many centuries before. "God has imprisoned all in disobedience, but for a purpose, namely "so that God may be merciful to all." (Romans 11:32)

But, first things first. There is a bigger issue than just the mess, and that is a tendency to <u>miss</u> an opportunity for growth as we respond to the <u>mess</u>. Enter the relationship of "mess" and "miss." For every "mess" that we create or find ourselves in, there is opportunity for growth. Sometimes the opportunity is hidden. It doesn't jump out at us. And even if the opportunity did jump out at us, we might miss it. It's simply who we are. It's the price of free will.

And that condition isn't going to change any time soon, if ever. All the more reason to be alert and cautious and mindful that forgiveness is available in Christ, should we **miss** the **mess**. And we will. But it doesn't have to be "always." Isaiah reminds us that "salvation will come, and deliverance will be revealed." (Isaiah 56:1)

But, back to our lesson for today from **Paul's Letter to the Romans**. "For by the grace given to me I say to everyone among you not to think of yourself more highly than you ought to think, but to think with sober judgment, each according to the measure of faith that God has assigned."

You know the term "original sin." It's the human condition to which we are all subjected. It's the freedom to choose between good and evil. And, in most, if not all, cases, we know the difference going in. Yet sometimes we make the wrong choice anyway. We can knowingly miss the mess. It's called "turn a blind eye." Or we can address the mess. As in, "How can I help, Lord?"

And, here we are, confessing our sins, seeking forgiveness, and promising to do better as servants of a Living and Loving God. And we don't do this just once. We do it often. Maybe daily, maybe weekly, maybe rarely, maybe only when the mess we are in is a really big mess. The response varies, but the condition, the reality of messhood, doesn't vary.

But, here's the Good News, the really awesome news, that news that draws us here, together. This Good News is available for the asking, and always delivered, if our hearts are open to that forgiveness and ready to adjust behavior.

Of course, accepting the Lord's forgiveness is almost as tough as believing in it. Just ask Peter. In today's Gospel, Peter innocently asks Jesus to explain a parable. And how does Jesus respond? He says to Peter, "Are you still without understanding?"

But, bless his heart, Peter kept working at understanding and sharing. Which is exactly what you and I do right here. We work at understanding. And, as we develop that understanding, we share God's love. Yes, "You, Peter, you St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, can make a difference. Share the love. Recognize the mess, address the mess, help clean-up the mess. Oh yes, there will be another mess, but we promise to grow in our role of both recognizing the mess and helping address the mess.

The last thing we want to do is miss the mess, whether out of ignorance or deliberately. It's a pretty clear choice, isn't it. The hymn we just sang reinforces the choice: "Tis the gift to come down where we ought to be." The "valley of love and delight." The valley where the Lord lives and wants us to live.

"Wait just a minute" you say. Today's gospel ends with this verse: "Then he, Jesus, sternly ordered the disciples not to tell anyone that he, Jesus, was the Messiah." Why would Jesus tell them to keep quiet? Because, at that point, the Crucifixion hadn't happened, much less the Resurrection. It would be the Resurrection that would confirm his identity as the Messiah. It would be at that point that the disciples could proclaim boldly that the Messiah had arrived.

And, lest we forget, that message of hope and conviction is now in our hands. We too live on this side of the Resurrection. We know the importance of not missing the mess. Indeed, you and I are members of the custodial staff. **With keys**. That's the Lord's confidence in us. He wants to be able to say to us, as he did to the mom in today's gospel, "Great is your faith."

The World is a messy place. We understand that. But we also know and appreciate that this mess has an antidote. And that antidote is from the Creator himself, herself, itself – pick your pronoun – and carries responsibility. Don't let the mess carry the day. Don't miss the mess. Using <u>our</u> gifts and talents, confront the mess head on. And know that we are in good company, the company of the Creator.

What a joy, what a privilege, what a team, what a captain. Jesus, for goodness sake. The Risen Christ. A healer (Matthew 15:28). And we can be healers too. And where does that healing take place? The hymn tells us: "In the place just right." That's where. Amen.

He answered, "Every plant that my heavenly Father has not planted will be uprooted. Let them alone; they are blind guides of the blind. And if one blind person guides another, both will fall into a pit." But Peter to him, "Explain this parable to us." Then he said, "Are you also still without understanding? Do you not see that whatever goes into the mouth enters the stomach, and goes out into the sewer? But what comes out of the mouth proceeds fom the heart, and this is what defiles. For out of the heart comes evil intentions, murder adultery, fornication, theft, false witness, slander. These are what defile a person, but to eat with unwashed hands dot not defile." Jesus left that place and went away to the district of Tyre and Sidon. Just then a Canaanite woman from that region came out and started shouting, "Have mercy on me, Lord, Son of David; my daughter is tormented by a demon." But he did not answer her at all. And his disciples came and urged him, saying, "Send her away, for she keeps shouting after us." He answered, "I was sent only to the lost sheep of the house of Israel." But she came and knelt before him, saying, "Lord, help me." He answered, "It is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." She said, "I Yes, Lord, yet even the dogs eat the crumbs that fall from their master' table." Then Jesus answered her, "Woman, great is your faith! Let it be done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed instantly.
