Sermon preached by the Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 16th Sunday of Pentecost, September 8, 2024.

In today's Gospel: "Jesus has done everything well; he even makes the deaf to hear and the mute to speak." (Mark 7:37)

No wonder that Jesus is highly regarded. Why wouldn't we want to learn more about this carpenter from Nazareth and his remarkable healing ability? After all, we could use a little healing ourselves. Maybe he can help <u>us</u>. Maybe not at the level of healing that we see in today's gospel. But at some level that would enhance our lives and the lives of those we touch.

God expects you and me to lead by example. After all, God leads by example. Can you say "Jesus of Nazareth"?

Yes, Jesus is our example. We have found for ourselves and others that the Path of Christ is rewarding and healing for ourselves and those we touch in the Name of Christ.

Think of a muscle. It wants to be used. It wants to be applied. It wants it to help. That is what the muscle is there for. To be recognized, developed, maintained, and applied in helpful ways.

You and I are Muscles for Christ. We admire the manner by which Jesus pursued his purpose. It wasn't easy, but it was worth it. We're here after all, centuries later, in thanksgiving. And in our own training and in applying this training to a world in need.

And that world in need includes ourselves, our families, our neighbors, and, yes, even our enemies. God wants us, and expects us, to help keep the Creation on a positive path. The Letter of James has a phrase for this path: "Mercy triumphs over judgment." (James 2:13) It's a heavy order, a big expectation, but that's what muscles are for. We have been tapped to assist the Creator. And we have felt the tap, and are now tapping ourselves. Welcome to the Church of Christ.

It's not an easy task, by any means. But it is a satisfying task for ourselves and for others. Muscles have a purpose, and we are pursuing that purpose. And it's a very good feeling to be doing what God has designed us to do.

The Good News is that we can pursue that calling in a whole bunch of ways. Think of the gyms that are available to us. And think of all the different machines in those gyms – and perhaps in our basements - that can help us develop muscles.

And think of all the different exercises that strengthen those muscles. Again, we can think of churches as gyms. St. Christopher is a gym. The Bible is a gym. The life of Christ is a gym. Maybe we are gyms. Do we help keep ourselves and others in good shape? That's what we're doing right here and wherever and however we share our relationship with the Lord.

We come together to remind ourselves of our purpose in life, which is to care for the Creation. But workouts are tough if we're doing them alone. Partners in muscle development are helpful. Think of confession and absolution and fresh starts. These we can pursue alone. Just ourselves and the Lord. But isn't it true that our gym experience is enhanced if we have a spotter?

That's what the Lord is for us. And it is what we can be for others. We can do things on our own most of the time, but sometimes we need help. Somebody, by our side, to rescue us from weight too great for us. From today's Psalm: "Happy are they who have the God of Jacob for their help!" (Psalm 46:4)

Think of Jesus as the spotter. One who helps us when we need help. We feel more confident in life with a spotter. Jesus doesn't do all the work us, but he reminds us of both our potential and limitations and our ability to make adjustments.

We are spotters for others. And isn't it a good feeling to be able to help others achieve their goals? And to have others help us achieve our goals? From today's passage from Isaiah: "Be strong, do not fear. Here is your God." (Isaiah 35:4)

That's our role in this setting, isn't it. If we didn't need help, we wouldn't be here. But, when we recognize that we need help, it sure is comforting to know that Jesus the Spotter is available. And not just available, but eager to help us.

Many of you are familiar with Spotify. It's the on-line service that makes all sorts of music accessible. And it has an interesting and, to me, an ironic symbol. A circle, with three wavy lines inside, all three of which express to me sadness rather than happiness. It would make more sense to flip the three lines so that the symbol conveys happiness. You keep the simplicity but convey a different message.

But what's your point Mr. Preacher? Only to suggest that when we access Spotify, we think of Jesus the Spotter. One who gives you and me confidence as we pursue our lives. We will stumble – that's our nature - but we will also get back up. Jesus helps us do that. He is the muscle that saves us. The capital S Spotter, if you will. With an expectation that we will be spotters for others in Christ's Name.

One more thought. Going to the gym, working out if you will, is good for us and for others. Church is a gym. Not any old gym. But a gym designed **by the Lord** for our benefit and the benefit of others. Welcome to this very handsome gym called St. Christopher by the Sea. With a logo, not of a sad, exhausted face, but of a cross – The Cross – a powerful symbol of God's love for us and, in thanksgiving, our love for God.

Can you hear God calling, as our coaches called us? Give me 10! 10 push-ups. 10 commandments. Makes us stronger. And through us, makes the world stronger.

You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery,"

also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the Law. So speak and so act as those who are to be judged by the law of liberty. For judgment will be without mercy to anyone who has shown no mercy; mercy triumphs over judgment. What good is it, my brothers and sisters, if you say you have faith but do not have works? Can faith save you? If a brother or sister is naked and lacks daily food, and one of you says to them, "Go in peace; keep warm and eat your fill," and yet you do not supply their bodily needs, what is the good of that? So faith by itself, if it has no works, is dead.
