First Reading: Jeremiah 15:15-21

O Lord, you know; remember me and visit me, and bring down retribution for me in my persecutors. In your forbearance do not take me away; know that on your account I suffer insult. Your words were found, and I ate them, and your words became to me a joy and the delight of my heart; for I am called by your name, O Lord, God of hosts. I did not sit in the company of merrymakers, nor did I rejoice; under the weight of your hand I sat alone, for you had filled me with indignation. Why is my pain unceasing, my wound incurable, refusing to be healed? Truly, you are to me like a deceitful brook, like waters that fail. Therefore thus says the Lord: If you turn back, I will take you back, and you shall stand before me. If you utter what is precious, and not what is worthless, you shall serve as my mouth. It is they who will turn to you, not you who will turn to them. And I will make you to this people a fortified wall of bronze; they will fight against you, but they shall not prevail over you, for I am with you to save you and deliver you, says the Lord. I will deliver you out of the hand of the wicked, and redeem you from grasp of the ruthless.

Second Reading: Romans 12:9-21

Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good; love one another with mutual affection; outdo one another in showing honor. Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord. Rejoice in hope, be patient in suffering, persevere in prayers. Contribute to the needs of the saints; extend hospitality to strangers. Bless those who persecute you; bless and do not curse them. Rejoice with those who rejoice, weep with those who weep. Live in harmony with one another; do not be haughty, but associate with the lowly; do not claim to be wiser than you are. Do not repay anyone evil for evil, but take thought for what is noble in the sight of all. If it is possible, so far as it depends on you, live peaceably with all. Beloved, never avenge yourselves, but leave room for the wrath of God; for it is written, "Vengeance is mine, I will repay, says the Lord." No, "if your enemies are hungry, feed them; if they are thirsty, give them something to drink; for by doing this you will heap burning coals on their heads." Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good.

Gospel: Matthew 16:21-28

Jesus began to show his disciples that he must go to Jerusalem and undergo great suffering at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, and be killed, and on the third day be raised. And Peter took him aside and began to rebuke him, saying, "God forbid it, Lord! This must never happen to you." But he turned and said to Peter, "Get behind me, Satan! You are a stumbling block to me;

for you are setting your mind, not on divine things but on human things." Then Jesus told his disciples, "If any want to become my followers, let them deny themselves and take up their cross and follow me. For those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it. For what will it profit them if they gain the whole world but forfeit their life? Or what will they give in return for their life? For the Son of Man is to come with his angels in the glory of his Father, and then he will repay everyone for what has been done. Truly I tell you, there are some standing here who will not taste death before they see the Son of Man coming in his kingdom."

The Gospel of the Lord. Praise to you, Lord Christ.

Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 14th Sunday after Pentecost, September 3, 2023.

Our lessons today are all over the place. Probably because there are different speakers with different agendas. But there is something in common, and that is that these agendas are ours as well.

Jeremiah is angry. Kind of snarky. "O Lord, remember me on your account I suffer insult Truly, you are to me like a deceitful brook, like waters that fail." (Jeremiah 15:15)

We feel that way sometimes, don't we? We pray for a certain outcome, and seemingly get a different outcome.

But the Lord stays with us. "If you turn back, I will take you back, and you shall stand before me.I am with you to save you and deliver you."

We've been there also, haven't we? Maybe we're there right now. Angry with the Lord for apparently not listening to us, or worse, listening but not doing what we want.

But, we don't give up. We don't give up on ourselves and we don't give up on our Lord. That is the gist of today's Psalm (Psalm 26:3). "For your love is before my eyes; I have walked faithfully with you Lord, I love the house in which you dwell, and the place where your glory abides."

"That's more like it" the Lord says. "Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good." Paul writes to the Romans: "Do not lag in zeal, be ardent in spirit, serve the Lord." (Romans 10:12)

Now, we're back on track. Or, are we?

In Matthew's gospel (Matthew 16:25), Jesus takes Peter aside to remind him that "those who want to save their life will lose it, and those who lose their life for my sake will find it."

"Lose their life for my sake." Is that the price that we must pay – losing our life - to receive God's approval? Surely we don't have to take these words literally. We feel the love of God, and we're still here. We're <u>living</u> for Christ, not <u>dying</u> for Christ.

Is it okay to be alive for Christ? Well, I sure hope so. Because that's what we're doing right now. We're not hanging from a cross. Death is not at our door. Or, so we hope.

But death will be at our door at some point. And we won't always know what or when that point will be. So, what do we do? Well, we make the best of <u>this life</u>, day by day, including thanking the Lord for being by our side through it all.

"Thanking the Lord." That's our lifestyle, if you will. And it works well for us. Bumps in the road? Oh yes, including some of our own making. But also many smooth portions in the road. Blessings if you will. Often a result of the Lord picking us up and reminding us that there are better days ahead. Sin <u>and</u> forgiveness, with forgiveness coming out on top.

At least, that's our faith. Imagine facing the bumps without that faith. Not a pretty sight. No, we'll stick with the Lord, thank you very much. With the hope that we will hear these words: "Servant, well done." (Hymn 541, stanza 5)

This kind of positive thinking is a choice that we make. God doesn't force it on us. God makes lots of suggestions, and, if we listen, maybe some warnings. But God doesn't insist on our allegiance. Yet, when our allegiance weakens, God is there to renew our spirits. God is never very far away.

That's what the Holy Spirit is all about. The God who makes the rules not only allows for our misadventures, but provides a ramp for the real adventure, which is coming home to the Lord.

You and I do a lot of coming home to the Lord. And don't we feel better for having done so? Even when we're angry with the Lord, we appreciate the Lord's presence. There is no sign on the Lord's door that says "Don't even bother."

But there are some other signs that the Lord could post. Here are a few of those. "Finally." "It's about time." "Where have you been?" "I suppose you want even more forgiveness."

Oh yes, the Lord could be snarky if the Lord so chose. But, given the choice, the Lord has decided on forgiveness. "You and I are saved. Period!"

Whether we accept that decision, of course, is up to us. It doesn't change the outcome. God has made a decision. We are saved. The next step is up to us. Which would be an enormous "THANK YOU, LORD."

That's the STEP, that's the response, that's the horse which has been offered and which you and I have decided to ride. We haven't created the opportunity. That's what God has done. That's what God is doing. That's what God will continue to do.

Given all of that, what's not to like about the One we honor right here every time we gather.

And what response does God look for from us? A THANK YOU. That's it. A THANK YOU.

If we take that THANK YOU step – and we're doing so right now and every time we help a neighbor or a stranger - there's a smile on God's face. A smile that is stronger, greater, more powerful, more lasting than whatever "stumbling blocks" Satan can offer.

Out final hymn today is "Give praise and glory unto God." Here are the highlights of the three stanzas. This is why we gather.

with balm my inmost heart he fills, his comfort all my anguish stills exult in thy creative might that doeth all things well and right through all his kingdom's wide domain, his righteousness and justice rein.

No snarkiness there! Just the opposite. To which we say "Thank you, Lord."
