Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 5thSunday of Easter, May 7, 2023.

Our subject today is cornerstone.

Cornerstone has a precise meaning and a general meaning. The precise meaning is an actual stone block that marks ceremoniously the purpose of a building. Who occupies the building and for what purpose? Often this information is inscribed in a stone block at the corner of a building. Many of you have worked or are working in buildings that feature inscribed cornerstones.

But, what about the general meaning of cornerstone? Well, it means foundation, and it can applied to people as well as to buildings. What is at the core of our being. What drives us. What compels us. What gives us meaning. Either as an individual or as a community or both.

In our second reading today (I Peter 2:5), Peter says, "See, I am laying in Zion a stone, a cornerstone, chosen and precious." He is talking here about the Risen Christ. For Peter, Christ was the foundation of Peter's life. It was Christ who gave Peter and others compelling strength. Christ was born for a purpose. He died for a purpose. And he rose to new life for a purpose.

And guess what. Two thousand years later, you and I are proclaiming the same belief. In many different ways, we have included the Risen Christ in our building, our lives. We have identified him, chosen him, as our cornerstone, our foundation, our strength. And, in all likelihood, our decision about a Jesus cornerstone was influenced by the Holy Spirit.

Now, not everyone has made the same choice. Others have different foundations for how they lead their lives. Choosing a foundation is one of the things people do. For example, when we sit down with our children, we encourage them to think about a foundation for their lives.

We share the Jesus foundation, yes, but we also respect different foundation choices. And we emphasize that happy people, successful people, have strong foundations. And we try really hard to be foundations ourselves for our children and our communities. Nations and companies and families and communities of all sorts, without strong foundations, are vulnerable and not as happy as they could be.

Jesus is very clear about this relationship. From this morning's gospel (John 14:1-14): "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God. Believe also in me. ... I am the way, and the truth, and the life."

Jesus was not shy, was he? He understood his role in the scheme of things, and he stayed with that understanding up to, during, and beyond his death. He knew his role, and it was to be a foundation like no other. "Spiritual milk" with a kick, according to Peter (I Peter2:2). "The way, the truth, and the life," according to Jesus himself (John 14:6).

One of the exercises recommended during the Season of Lent is to revisit foundations. What drives us? What fulfills us? What gives us satisfaction? Or, more to the point, who drives us, who fulfills us, who gives us satisfaction? In the words of today's **Psalm 31:15**: "Who rescues me from the hand of my enemies."

Yes, our families fit this profile – we hope and pray. But is our foundation broader than just our immediately family? Is there room for someone else? Is there room for the Lord? And are we, am I, a sturdy foundation for others?

For example, are we, as a worshipping community, a good foundation for this Island? We hope so. We think so. We strive to be so. But, could we be doing more?

Well, it starts with us as individuals, doesn't it? Are we as individuals a "spiritual house"? Peter asked this question, and reminded us that we are a "chosen race, a royal priesthood, a holy nation." (1 Peter2:5) We take our individual cornerstones and blend them and offer the blend to others. Yes, we offer ourselves as individuals, but we also offer ourselves as a community, built on the foundation of Jesus Christ.

Is Jesus the only choice? Again, no, there are many foundation options. Jesus is one of them. And, for you and me, in this setting, he is the best option. Why? Because his love is comprehensive. No one is left out. Even if and when we reject Jesus, Jesus does not reject us. How special is that!

Our final hymn today is "In the cross of Christ I glory." This hymn (#441) is filled with beautiful verse. Here's the third stanza: "When the sun of bliss is beaming

light and love upon my way, from the cross the radiance streaming adds new luster to the day."

"Radiance streaming." That's a pretty good foundation, isn't it? Well worth receiving ourselves and passing this gift along to others. A shared cornerstone, if you will.

And – this is important – shared right now. In this life. This year. This week. Today. Or whenever a person or a people or a nation or a world needs some "radiance streaming."

We're used to "video streaming" aren't we? We might have watched something last night that was "video streamed." Well, what are the elements of video streaming? There are two: a server and a client.

Well, when it comes to the Good News of Jesus, you are I are now the "server." We have received content – that would be Jesus – and now we share that content. It's as if we just saw a live-streamed concert, and can't wait to recommend that concert to others.

Yes, the Lord is our foundation of choice. The Lord is our cornerstone. Receiving that Lord is a conscious decision on our part. There are other foundations out there. We could pick other cornerstones. We could receive other streamed concerts. But, for us, for you and me, the "radiance" wouldn't be as comprehensive, wouldn't be as lasting, wouldn't be as intriguing, and, yes, wouldn't be as joyful.

The selection of a life-foundation is a huge decision when we're building a life for ourselves and when we are guiding children and neighbors and strangers in their search. The Lord is one of the options. And, as far as we are concerned, it's the very best option.

"Radiance streaming." According to our hymnal, the author of Hymn 441 was born in 1792. He knew what we know, namely that it doesn't get any better than the Lord Jesus Christ.

Amen.
