Pentecost 3 sermon June 9, 2024

Today's lessons deal with relationships. In the Genesis passage, God interviews the man. Then God interviews the woman. The man confesses that he ate the apple, but he blames the woman. When confronted, the woman blames the serpent. So, what does God do? God punishes the serpent. "Dust you shall eat all the days of your life."

If you were the serpent, you would demand a recount. "Not my fault. Talk to those two people. What did you expect me to do?"

If you were the man you too would have an excuse. "She made me do it."

If you were the woman, you also would have an excuse. "The serpent made me do it."

Note that the man and woman have the same broad excuse. "It's somebody else's fault."

An observation: there is a lot of "somebody else's fault" going on in the world these days. The situation in the Middle East is a good example. And my guess is that we could probably cite a back and forth situation in our own lives. In other words, this lesson is for us.

Well, just what is the lesson? Here's a possibility. Put yourself in the other person's position. If you were the other person – the one you want to blame – how would you feel? In other words, does the other person have reason to blame you? And, if so, is there something you can do to lower the temperature? And, better yet, is there something both of you can do to lower the temperature?

That's what diplomats are trained for. And – here's the point for today – that's what God expects of you and me. Diplomacy. The ability, not only to see the other person's position, but to understand it, maybe even appreciate it. It is what we humans are trained for, after all.

Sometimes diplomacy doesn't work. Sometimes there is a dead-end to the relationship. Back to the drawing board, if you will.

Now, there's an interesting concept: the drawing board. A second chance to get things right. Not only with pencil and paper, but with a forgiving attitude.

Picture the drawing board. There is paper and there are pencils and there is a wastebasket. Sometimes second chances aren't enough. They wind up in the basket. Which leads to a third chance, and maybe more chances. We keep trying until we get it right. Whatever the "it" is.

And sometimes the basket gets full. And we need to empty the basket. In our setting here it's called forgiveness. God says, "Let me help. Give me the basket. I'll empty it for you. Now try again. And if the basket gets full again, I'll empty it again. Just keep trying.

And, so we do. We keep trying to get things right. And we do so with the understanding that God is there to help. Indeed sometimes the friends that we count on to help us are sent by God. They might not claim that role, but they just might be "instruments of peace."

And when we are helped by "instruments of peace," we see in ourselves the possibility of being such instruments. Yes, forgiveness is contagious. Both being forgiven and offering forgiveness.

One of the items that often accompanies a drawing board is a ruler, the purpose of which is to help draw a straight line. In human terms, it's called diplomacy. It minimizes the number of times that we need help. It frees us move along, including helping others. Can you say "best friends"?

Well, enough of the drawing board. All the help in the world, all the diplomacy if you will, won't change things if we don't want things to change or if others don't want things to change. And maybe that's a good thing. Maybe everybody needs a fresh start. Empty the basket and then return to the drawing board with a determination not to need the basket again, or at least not as often.

Too simple? Maybe impossible. Lots of reasons to give up, and let hurt feelings gain center stage. Which leads to war, the last thing we as a people, a country, a world need. It's not what God wants, and it's not what we want.

So, what's next? Well, somewhere in the "what's next" line is forgiveness. And it's forgiveness on the part of both parties. Diplomacy is the art of finding a middle ground, shared ground. It is at the United Nations. It is true in marriage counseling. Indeed, it is true in the struggles we, as individuals, have with ourselves.

I suspect that at some point you and I have entered this chapel, when no one else was around, and asked God for help. Maybe the ask is for help for ourselves. Maybe the ask is for others to help themselves. Maybe the ask is not an ask at all. Maybe we just want to take a break, when things that are troubling seem heavy.

When you think of conflict resolution, whether at the United Nations or within ourselves, a break is helpful. And maybe during that break, things that were cloudy come into focus. Think of the last time you entered this chapel during the week when no one else was around. That step, that decision, was probably helpful. You probably ended your visit with something like "Thank you, Lord, things are a little clearer now."

Exactly what the Lord wanted to hear. And exactly what we wanted to hear. It's at the heart of the expression "it takes two to tango." And it's at the heart of "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord."

Diplomacy is at the heart of religious conviction. And it's not automatic. It takes work. Which is a lot better than "it takes war."

Everywhere there is conflict, be it international or personal, an environment like this one is appropriate. People need to take breaks. On the world stage, taking a break can be a first step in conflict resolution. And, as is true in many situations, resolution begins with conviction. On the part of both parties. "Lord, we know that you are there for us. Help us please to continue to be there with you."

It's a choice on our part. Tough sledding? You bet. Worthwhile for combatants? You bet. What God wants us to do and expects us to do and is willing to help us to do takes a first step. To be a diplomat. To be a receiver of Good News and a transmitter of Good News. To be a bearer of Glad Tidings. "Go in peace to love and serve the Lord." What a great relationship! Amen.

First Reading: Genesis 3:8-15

The crowd came together again, so that Jesus and his disciples could not even eat. When his family heard it, they went out to restrain him, for people were saying, "He has gone out of his mind." And he called them to him, and spoke to them in parables, "How can Satan cast out Satan? If a kingdom is divided against itself, that kingdom cannot stand. And if a house is divided against itself, that house will not be able to stand. And if Satan has risen up against himself and is divided, he cannot stand, but his end has come.
