2nd Sunday of Easter – April 16, 2023

As you know, sometimes I give titles to sermons. I do so today. Today's title is "This one is for you." And it refers to Jesus speaking to Thomas (John 20:24-29). But it also refers to Jesus speaking to you and me. We're in this gospel.

All of us, baptized or not, ordained or not, go through periods of doubt as to whether this man Jesus is indeed God in human form. And each time we question <u>our</u> faith, we get a response from God which is the equivalent of "Put your finger in the mark of the nails in my hands and side."

God wants us to believe. That's why God engages us as another human being. "See for yourself" God says. It's a strategy, aimed at you and me. Not just theory, but physical contact. From **Acts 2:24**: "But <u>God raised him up</u>" so that Thomas could <u>actually touch</u> the Risen Christ.

Well, we don't have the option that Thomas had, so what is the next best response we can make? If not touching a wound, what?

That answer is going to vary from person to person, isn't it? But not everything is going to be different. We have the same basic issue, don't we? We want to believe. And sometimes that belief is strong, and other times that belief is shaky.

In a sense, we are "a work in progress" when it comes to our belief in Christ. It's a journey. There are moments when we are right there, just a few inches from touching the side of the Lord. But other times, maybe most of the time, there's some distance.

And usually, when there's separation, it's on us, not the Risen Christ. He's available. We are the doubters. We are Thomas.

But, also like Thomas, we can change our mind and take a chance. And, perhaps, just perhaps, that reluctant decision is a spiritual life-saver. Touching the wound of Christ can take many forms. And often that touch is over time. It's often a journey, not a poke. And it's a journey that pleases God. And it's a journey that pleases you and me.

Responding to the Lord is not easy. It's not comfortable. It's not a piece of cake. It takes courage to touch that wound. And God understands this. God respects our journey. And God respects the freedom to touch now or wait to touch or not to touch at all.

If we didn't have some sense of God being close to us, even when we keep our distance from God, you and I probably wouldn't be here today. But we are here. We apparently want to stay on God's radar whether we're ready or not.

Please, God. I'm not ready to touch yet. I need more time. I'm almost there, but there remains doubt that is holding me back.

But I do believe that you are there, and will stay there, with your arms open, and will welcome me when I'm ready. Don't give up on me.

And, of course, God doesn't give up on us. The Thomas episode proves that. He had multiples chances before he finally said "Yes, Lord. I'm ready."

You and I are at some stage of a belief journey. Only you know where you are in terms of validating the Resurrection. For all of us, I suspect, there remains room for growth, for deeper belief, for reporting for duty.

And when we're ready, the Lord will greet us. And, in the meantime, the Lord will be patient. And when we resist the whole notion of being a child of God, God will be extra patient.

From today's Gospel **(John 20:29)**: "Jesus said to him – and to you and me – have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe."

That's where we are. We are in process. We are "coming to believe." And it's pretty exciting, knowing that we're not going to be tossed from class because we have questions. We like to ask questions, almost as much as we like to answer questions. We really are a work in progress. And I don't think we would want it any other way. And, more to today's point, I don't think God would want it any other way.

Now, maybe this is wishful thinking. Maybe this is simply getting a grade of incomplete in God's Introductory Class. Presumably at some point we'll have a better idea of whether we want to stay with this class. What we know for sure is that God will continue to welcome us. Maybe even appoint us as classroom assistants. I'm hoping for Paper monitor. What a privilege.

And, for all of us, reviewing today's Psalm 16 is a useful exercise:

"You, God, will show me the path of life; in your presence, God, there is fullness of joy, and in your right hand, Lord, are pleasures for evermore." (Psalm 16:11)

And what is one of those pleasures? Being here, together, all of us as "works in progress." Not "Class dismissed," but "The Lord be with you."

And, as we accept that invitation, we begin to understand what Peter understood, and which he shared in our Second Reading today (I Peter1:3-9):

"Although we have not seen him, we love him; and even though we do not see him now, we believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, for we are receiving the outcome of our faith, the salvation of our souls."

That's a wonderful and accurate description of this worshipping community. "Paper, anybody?"

Hymn 174 – At the Lamb's High Feast We Sing

Almighty God, to you all hearts are open, all desires known, and from you no secrets are hid: Cleanse the thoughts of our hearts by the inspiration of your Holy Spirit, that we may perfectly love you, and worthily magnify your holy Name; through Christ our Lord. Amen.

Glory to God in the highest, and peace to his people on earth. Lord God, heavenly King, almighty God and Father, we worship you, we give you thanks, we praise you for your glory. Lord Jesus Christ, only Son of the Father, Lord God, Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world: have mercy on us; you are seated at the right hand of the Father: receive our prayer. For you alone are the Holy One, you alone are the Lord, you alone are the Most High, Jesus Christ, with the Holy Spirit, in the glory of God the Father. Amen.

Nicene Creed – page 358

We believe in one God, the Father, the almighty, maker of heaven and earth, of all that is seen and unseen.

Sanctify them by your Holy Spirit to be for your people the Body and Blood of your Son, the holy food and drink of new and unending life in him.

Sanctify us also that we may faithfully receive this holy Sacrament, and serve you in unity, constancy, and peace; and at the last day bring us with all your saints into the joy of your eternal kingdom.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *Amen*.

Collect: Almighty and everlasting God, who in the Paschal mystery established the new covenant of reconciliation: Grant that all who have been reborn into the fellowship of Christ's Body may show forth in their lives what they profess by their faith; through Jesus Christ our Lord, who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one god, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

First Reading: Acts 2:14a, 22-332

Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed the crowd, "Jesus of Nazareth, a man attested to you by God with deeds of power, wonders, and sign that God did through him among you, as you yourselves know – this man, handed over to you according to the definite plan and foreknowledge of God, you crucified and killed by the hands of those outside the law. But God raised him up, having freed him from death, because it was impossible for him to be held in its power. For David says concerning him, 'I saw the Lord always before me, for he is at my right hand so that I will not be shaken; therefore my heart was glad, and my tongue rejoiced; moreover my flesh will live in hope. For you will not abandon my soul to Hades, or let your Holy One experience corruption. You have made known to me the ways of life; you will make me full f gladness with our presence.' Fellow Israelites, I may say to you confidently of our ancestor David that he both died and was buried, and his tomb is with us to this day. Since he was a prophet, he knew that God had sworn, with an oath to him, that he would put one of his descendants on his throne. Foreseeing this, David spoke of the resurrection of the Messiah, saying, 'He was not abandoned to Hades, nor did his flesh experience corruption.' This Jesus God raised up, and, of that, all of us are witnesses."

In this you rejoice, even if now for a little while you have had to suffer various trials, so that the genuineness of your faith – being more precious than gold that, though perishable, is tested by fire – may be found to result in praise and glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. Although you have not seen him, you love him; and even thou you do not see him now, you believe in him and rejoice with an indescribable and glorious joy, for you are receiving the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

Gospel: John 20:19-31

When it was evening on that day, the first day of the week, and the doors of the house where the disciples had met were locked for fear of the Jews, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you." After he said this, he showed them his hands and his side. Then the disciples rejoiced when they saw the Lord. Jesus said to them, again, "Peace be with you. As the Father has sent me, so I send you." When he had said this, he breathed on them and said to them, "Receive the Holy Spirit. If you forgive the sins of any, they are forgiven them; if you retain the sins of any, they are retained." But Thomas (who was called the Twin), one of the twelve, was not with them when Jesus came. So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord." But he said to them, "Unless I see the mark of the nails in his hands, and put my finger in the mark of the nails and my hand in his side, I will not believe." A week later his disciples were again in the house, and Thomas was with them. Although the doors were shut, Jesus came and stood among them and said, Peace be with you." Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here and see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it in my side. Do not doubt but believe." Thomas answered him, "My Lord and my God!" Jesus said to him, "Have you believed because you have seen me? Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have come to believe." Now Jesus did many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not written in this book. But these are written so that you may come to believe that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that through believing you may have life in his name.
