Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 3rd Sunday of Epiphany, January 21, 2024.

Some of you, I trust, have discovered that when you are physically away from St. Christopher's on a Sunday morning, you can still "be present." Not only can you watch the service in progress, you can prepare for the service by reviewing the lessons that are posted each week prior to the Sunday service. Typically there are three documents posted: the service itself; the sermon; and the lessons.

My habit is to create the "lessons" document by typing the lessons. I have found that when I do so, I engage the lessons in a little deeper way than simply reading the insert. I often see things that I don't see otherwise. Things that don't jump off the page when I <u>read</u> them, sometimes jump off the page when I <u>type</u> them. And when they do catch my attention, they are part of a theme.

Maybe not the theme that the editors had in mind, but a theme that struck me as important and really interesting, or both.

Today is an example.

From the Collect, the adverb "readily."
From the Jonah passage, the phrase "second time."
From the Psalm, the phrase "fleeting breath."
From First Corinthians, the phrase "appointed time."
From Mark's Gospel, the phrase "time is fulfilled."

The combination of these "time" entries suggests that you and I need to get to work. Not just because "putting off things" is a dangerous habit, but because "putting off things" can mean that we are missing out on the joy of those "things." It's the difference between avoiding the bad and inviting the good.

This environment – right here, with all of you - is the <u>latter</u>. We gather to enjoy, to give thanks, to see how we can help one another, including those we do not even know. We don't gather, I trust, to keep the devil at bay. We meet rather to give thanks for the Lord being in our midst and encouraging us to lead lives of joy and service.

We are in the midst of our "appointed time." And the appointment is not to slam the door on the devil, but to invite the devil in, so that the devil can see what <u>real</u> joy is all about. "Welcome, Mr. Devil. Have a seat please. Let me introduce our family."

In Jesus, you and I are experiencing what the world needs. Hope, thanksgiving, promise, joy, confidence, beauty, forgiveness. We don't focus on limitations. We focus on possibilities. And, indeed in Jesus, we focus on <u>Victory</u>. Not just a "full net of fish," but a "community of believers."

Yes, in his Letter to the Corinthians, Paul warns us that "The appointed time has grown short." Well, guess what. We took heed. St. Christopher-by-the-Sea is alive and well. We don't take continuity for granted. Rather we recognize that we have a responsibility to dig deep and to share generously and to view time as an <u>opportunity</u> rather than as a <u>limitation</u>. We are part of a continuum. We have received a blessing. Now we share the blessing. Our generation has a foot in history and a foot in the future. And, as we know right this minute, we have our time right now. The Present.

As fisher-people, you and I have a choice. We can pull the net in and enjoy a final meal. Or we can pull the net in, renew our energy by sharing the meal, and then re-cast the net. Well, we are in the re-casting business, aren't we? And we're pretty darn good at it.

At our Christmas Eve service, there were quite a few little people whom we had baptized this past year. And, for a few moments, some of them were no longer being held by parents. They were romping around, with big smiles.

In the spirit of today's theme, <u>their time is coming</u>. And, more to the point of today for you and me, <u>our time remains active</u>. Baton passing, after all, requires practice, practice, practice.

And, during practice, we enjoy one another's company. We are a team. Who knew that practice could be so much fun. Well, we came to know, didn't we? This is our time, and we're treating it with loving care. Not only in honor of those who have gone before, and not only in encouragement of those who will come later, but in thanksgiving for what's going on right now in this generation of

St. Christopher-by-the- Sea.

We are custodians of the Good News. What an honor and what fun. Is God calling us to have fun? I think so. Yes, the Good News is entitled appropriately. Our time is here, and, may I be so bold as to suggest that we are upholding our custodial responsibility pretty well. It's not only re-assuring. It's re-invigorating. Which I think is what our Lord had in mind all along. Others will learn from us. And we, as teachers, will enjoy that process.

As this little gem of a church heads into a new century of proclamation and service, it will be the privilege of others to accept the baton of faith, and run yet another leg. Our job, our privilege, our joy, at this point in time – our time – is to lay the ground work for another century.

The critical moment in a relay race is of course the passing of the baton. The one with the baton doesn't toss it to the next person. He or she places the baton in the next person's back-stretched hand. The reception is complete, at least for one more leg of the journey.

Right now, we are a mix of passers and receivers. And what's even more exciting is that we are both. We don't <u>just</u> pass or don't <u>just</u> receive. The exchange varies, doesn't it? In a sense, we are all learners and we are all teachers. And the roles vary depending on the subject.

What we have in common though, at all times, in all centuries, is the Love of God in Christ Jesus. He is the Subject. That's the Good News that we share with one another in this setting and beyond. This is <u>our</u> time, <u>our</u> turn, to share, to model, to proclaim. The baton is in our hands, not to keep, not to store, not to ignore, but to share in ways that make sense to us and that might well make sense to others.

I'm not sure which is more exciting: the reception of the Good News or the passing of the Good News. The best answer, of course, is not one <u>or</u> the other, but both.

Here's to our time. Our generation. Our century. And, as a reminder, here's a baton. May the pass be with you. Amen.
