Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, August 13, 2023.

Here's the theme for today's lessons. "Careful what you ask for." Especially when we think that God is not there to help us complete a task.

In our first lesson **(I Kings 19:10)** Elijah is depressed. He has done all that the Lord has asked him to do, and the people are not thankful. "I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." What is the Lord's response? The Lord gives Elijah even more to do. "You want more? I'll give you more. Anoint Jehu and Elisha and put them to work."

In today's Epistle **(Romans 10:14)**, Paul, speaking for the Lord, gives the early Christians in Rome even more do. "But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim?" The message: Get back to work. There is plenty to do.

In today's Gospel **(Matthew 14:30)**, Jesus asks Peter to join him in the boat. Peter starts out, but is frightened by the wind and pleads with the Lord, "Save me." Jesus does save Peter, but not before saying to Peter "You of little faith, why did you doubt?"

When you and I pray, do we sometimes ask for too much? Do we sometimes ask for Jesus to make up the difference between starting a job and finishing a job? Do we sometimes recognize that our trust in the Lord is a bit shaky? Yes, we can be impatient, even when we are the ones who asked for an assignment and then complained when the assignment was tougher than we imagined.

Fortunately for you and me, God is used to handling complaints. Yes, God receives praise and thanksgiving. But God also receives the occasional "Dear Lord, give me a break. All those people whom you want me to help ... Many of them don't recognize the help, and, even among those who recognize the help, the gratitude doesn't last. And it bugs me. It makes me not want to help at all." To which God responds "Are you upset with them or with me?"

At which point, we take a deep breath and confess to God that our anger is selfdirected. We know better. We know that you, Lord, don't ask of us anything more than we can handle. You, Lord, handled the Big Cross. We can handle or at least help with the little ones.

Back to our theme: "Be careful what you ask for." "Little crosses" are still crosses. There is still the potential for pain, not only for others, but for ourselves. And, if that pain is real, even though modified or subdued, can we handle <u>it</u>? Maybe the "little cross" is bigger than we thought. Maybe we can't handle the pain. Here we were worried about the Cross Jesus hung on, and we can't even find time for a neighbor or a stranger or a family member or a condition crying out for help.

Well, welcome to the human condition, which ironically is made tougher because we have Jesus as our leader. His expectations are high. Love God and love neighbor. "Easy for you to say, Jesus. You are God. We are not. Maybe if someone else was our leader, you wouldn't ask so much of us."

Is this what we want? An easier human condition? A different leader with smaller expectations? Jayvee rather than varsity? I don't think so, and you don't either. We're here. That's the way we like it. Not always easy. Indeed maybe never easy. But we wouldn't want it any other way. So, let's keep going. You keep challenging, God. And we'll keep trying. After all, it's not as if there is never rest time or a water break. Can you say "prayer" and "communion"?

In our first reading today, Elijah is tired and spends the night in a cave **(I Kings 19:9)**. He needs a break. And guess what happens. "Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, 'What are you doing here, Elijah?'" Elijah responds "The Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." The short version is "I've had it, Lord. I can't keep going."

The Lord's response is not "I understand, Elijah. I'll ask someone else to help." No, the Lord gives Elijah even more to do, not less.

Sound familiar? Ever tried to tell God "Go ask somebody else"? It doesn't work, does it? God might provide help, clearer directions, best practices, teammates.

But God doesn't say "Not to worry, I'll try someone else. You do your thing, I'll do mine." God might well get others to help, but it's never in lieu of you and me. In addition to? Yes. But never in lieu of.

Which just happens to be one of the reasons you and I are here. God keeps calling. And we keep listening. And, in addition to listening, we keep trying our best. But we know that we are at "our best" when we have teammates. And, we do - right here. We keep one another on our toes. When one is down, another is up. When one is tired, another is renewed. When one is satisfied with jayvee, another invites us to a voluntary practice, with varsity in sight.

And whom do we meet at that voluntary practice? We meet the Lord, the Coach, who doesn't ask of us any more than the Coach asks of self. And how does the Coach greet us? In the same way Jesus greeted Peter in today's gospel. "Take heart, it is I; do be afraid."

And so the voluntary practice commenced, and here we are. Perhaps tired, but renewed. And in the presence of the Lord himself. And what do we say to Coach Jesus? "Lord, put me in. I think I'm ready." And what does Coach Jesus say to you and me? "You better be ready. The enemy is tough. So, there's a lot to do. But I will be with you. And, together, we will make a difference."

Our final hymn today – 664 - reinforces this theme of God as difference maker. The hymn begins with this phrase: "My Shepherd will supply my need, Jehovah is his Name." And ends with this phrase: "No more a stranger or a guest, but like a child at home." In other words, safe with the Lord.

First Reading: I Kings 19:9-18

Elijah came to a cave, and spent the night there. Then the word of the Lord came to him, saying, "What are you doing here, Elijah?" He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." He said, "Go out and stand on the mountain before the Lord, for the Lord is about to pass by." Now there was a great wind, so strong that it was splitting mountains and breaking rocks in pieces before the Lord, but the Lord was not in the wind; and after the wind an earthquake, but the Lord was not in the earthquake; and after the earthquake a fire, but the Lord was not in the fire; and after the fire a sound of sheer silence. When Elijah heard it, he wrapped his face in his mantle and went out and stood at the entrance of the cave. Then there came a voice to him that said "What are you doing here, Elijah?" He answered, "I have been very zealous for the Lord, the God of hosts; for the Israelites have forsaken your covenant, thrown down your altars, and killed your prophets with the sword. I alone am left, and they are seeking my life, to take it away." Then the Lord said to him, "Go, return on your way to the wilderness of Damascus; when you arrive, you shall anoint Hazael as king over Aram. Also you shall anoint Jehu son Nimshi as king over Israel; and you shall anoint Elisha son of Shaphat of Abel-meholah as prophet in your place. Whoever escapes from the sword of Hazael, Jehu shall kill; and whoever escapes from the sword of Jehu, Elisha shall kill. Yet I will leave seven thousand in Israel, all the knees that have not bowed to Baal, and every mouth that has not kissed him."

I will listen to what the Lord God is saying, for he is speaking peace to his faithful people and to those who turn their hearts to him.

Second Reading: Romans 10:5-15

Moses writes concerning the righteousness that comes from the law, that "the person who does these things will live by them." But the righteousness that comes from faith says, "Do not say in your heart, 'Who will ascend into heaven?'" (that is, to bring Christ down) "or 'Who will descend into the abyss?" (that is, to bring Christ up from the dead). But what does it say? "The word is near you, on your lips and in your heart" (that is, the word of faith that we proclaim); because if you confess with your lips that Jesus is Lord and believe in your heart that God raised him from the dead, you will be saved. For one believes with the heart and so is justified, and one confesses with the mouth and so saved. The scripture says, "No one who believes in him will be put to shame." For there is no distinction between Jew and Greek; the same Lord is Lord of all and is generous to all who call on him. For, "Everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved." But how are they to call on one in whom they have not believed? And how are they to believe in one of whom they have never heard? And how are they to hear without someone to proclaim him? And how are they to proclaim him unless they are sent? As it is written, "How beautiful are the feet of those who bring good news!"

Gospel: Matthew 14:22-33

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead to the other side while he dismissed he crowds. And after he had dismissed the crowds, he went up the mountain by himself to pray. When evening came, he was there alone, but by this time the boat, battered by the waves, was far from the land, for the wind was against them. And early in the morning he came walking toward them on the sea. But when the disciples saw him walking on the sea, they were terrified, saying, "It is a ghost!" And they cried out in fear. But immediately Jesus spoke to them, and said, "Take heart, it is I; do not be afraid." Peter answered him, "Lord, if it is you, command me to come to you on the water." He said, "Come." So Peter got out of the boat, started walking on the water, and came toward Jesus. But when he noticed the strong wind, he became frightened, and beginning to sink, he cried out, "Lord, save me!" Jesus immediately reached out his hand and caught him, saying to him, "You of little faith, why did you doubt?" When they got into the boat, the wind ceased. And those in the boat worshiped him, saying, "Truly you are the son of God."
