Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 16th Sunday after Pentecost, September 17, 2023.

Today's gospel lesson is sobering. "And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you – every one of us – if we do not forgive our brother or sister from the heart."

Okay! We hear you, Lord. Your message is clear. Chrystal clear. But, clear or not, it's confusing. Why? Because you promised that you would forgive us "seventy times seven." That's 4,900 acts of forgiveness. Surely I must have a balance in my account.

Good question. Do we have a balance? Have we checked lately? Maybe our account is dry, and we don't even know it. And, if that's the case, we had better be really, really good.

But that's not our nature, is it? A nature incidentally which you, Lord, instilled in us. "If my account is dry, it's at least partially your fault, Lord. You're the one who created us with these options. Surely we must share the blame. So there! Take that, Lord."

Whoa! Best we take a step back. After all, this is the Lord to whom we're talking. And we know from previous engagements that blaming the Lord for anything is not a good idea. Thankfully the Lord can be patient, and is patient, many times over. So let's not be cocky about all of this. Maybe a better response to the Lord is "I'm sorry. I know I can do better. And I'm grateful for yet another chance to show you that indeed I can do better and will do better. Forgive me, Lord."

To which the Lord responds, "Apology accepted. I'm happy to hear of your decision, not only to <u>listen</u> to me, but to <u>abide</u> by my words. I will be following closely just how well you do. Until next time. And, I suspect that there will be a next time. Not to worry, though, I'll be there again and I will listen again, and, yes, I will forgive again."

"Forgive again." Not a new concept. In today's passage from Genesis, God says to Joseph, and Joseph says to his brothers "Do not be afraid." The point is simply that

God's Love is really, really, really deep. Today's Psalm (Psalm 103:2) echoes this assurance: "Bless the Lord, O my soul, and forget not all his benefits."

And, here we are, centuries later, wrestling with the same issue of second and third and fourth chances. We recognize our disobedience, and praise God for His forgiveness. In his letter to the Romans (Romans 14:12), Paul also stresses that the Lord doesn't just sit around and watch us wander. No, the Lord "is able to make us stand." God is not sitting back and taking notes. God is engaged and forgiving time and time again. Yes, Jesus, God Incarnate, is the ultimate in reorientation, of getting things right, of nudging us in the right direction.

In the game blindman's bluff, the person, temporarily unsighted, listens carefully for a voice and responds to that voice. "Listening carefully" is a life-skill. It actually leads to seeing, to understanding, to touching. And, in this setting, it leads to being touched by the Creator of the Universe. Here we listen carefully in an attempt to get closer to God. But, unlike the game, God doesn't make things difficult. God, in Christ, actually gives us clues. Indeed, Christ is the **Great Clue**. God Himself touches us. A moment in history. A birth, a life, a death, a new life, an on-going life.

And what is our response to the on-going life? From Genesis: "Have no fear!"

But, we're not done, are we. We have today's Gospel lesson. "I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?" (Matthew 18:34) In other words, don't just enjoy the Lord's forgiveness by yourself. Share that forgiveness with others. And, lest you forget, I'll be watching you.

Our final hymn today - Come down, O Love divine – reminds us of our responsibility to share. It contains a wonderful phrase: "and kindle it, thy holy flame bestowing."

We are recipients of God's "holy flame." It's tempting sometimes just to receive that flame. But that's not the point of the flame. God's Love is meant to be more than merely received. It is meant to be shared. The verb "to kindle" has a "start" dimension to it. To kindle a flame is to light a fire. As God has stirred up you and me, so we are to stir up others by how we live. We don't hide our faith. We share it. God has lit the fire. In Jesus, God has showed us how to keep that fire going.

Well, we've mentioned the verb "to kindle," "to light a fire." What about the noun "kindle"? And especially "Kindle" with a capital K.

Kindle with a capital K is the name of a hand-held device developed by Amazon. Now, I have no idea whether Amazon holds the rights to Kindle the device. I'm sure that the answer is "yes." But ownership of a device design doesn't matter in our context here. We're talking here about ownership of all of Creation, all of History, all of Everything, including you and me and what we do right here every time we gather.

By our choice, we have said to the Creator that we will help care for the Creation, under the auspices of Jesus. It is as if there was a sign-up sheet on the bulletin board, with the opportunity to state our preference. And we checked the Jesus box, and, in so doing, we checked the whole Enterprise. And, here we are, fulfilling our stated desire.

It's all overwhelming, <u>except for</u> the decision of the Creator to engage us as one of us. "Come down, O Love divine." We can handle that engagement if we so choose. God is available to us in many ways, but there is no way more applicable to our situation than the Lord Jesus. "Let thy glorious light shine ever on my sight, and clothe me round, the while my path illuming."

And not just "my path," but the path of those with whom we share the privilege.

Here's our homework. It's always the same, and always a privilege. "O let it – the love of God in Christ – freely burn."

First Reading: Genesis 50:15-21

Welcome those who are weak in faith, but not for the purpose of guarreling over opinions. Some believe in eating anything, while the weak eat only vegetables. Those who eat must not despise those who abstain, and those who abstain must not pass judgment on those who who eat; for God has welcomed them. Who are you to pass judgment on servants of another? It is before their own Lord that they stand or fall. And they will be upheld, for the Lord is able to make them stand. Some judge one day to be better than another, while others judge all days to be alike. Let all be fully convinced in their own minds. Those who observe the day, observe it in honor of the Lord. Also those who eat, eat in honor of the Lord, since they give thanks to God; while those who abstain, abstain in honor of the Lord and give thanks to God. We do not live to ourselves, and we do not die to ourselves. If we live, we live to the Lord, and if we die, we die to the Lord; so then, whether we live or whether we die, we are the Lord's. For to this end Christ died and lived again, so that he might be Lord of both the dead and the living. Why do you pass judgment on your brother or sister? Or you, why do you despise your brother or sister? For we will all stand before the judgment seat of God. For it is written, "As I live, says the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall give praise to God." So then, each of us will be accountable to God.

Gospel: Matthew 18:21-35

Peter came and said to Jesus, "Lord, if another member of the church sins against me, how often should I forgive? As many as seven times?" Jesus said to him, "Not seven times, but, I tell you, seventy-seven times. For this reason the kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who wished to settle accounts with his slaves. When he began the reckoning, one who owed him ten thousand talents was brought to him; and, as he could not pay, his lord ordered him to be sold, together with his wife and children and all his possessions and payment to be made. So the slave fell on his knees before him, saying, 'Have patience with me, and I will pay you everything.' And, out of pity for him, the lord of that slave released him and forgave him the debt. But that same slave, as he went out, came upon one of his fellow slaves who owed him a hundred denarii; and seizing him by the throat, he said, 'Pay what you owe.' Then his fellow slave fell down and pleaded with him, "Have patience with me, and I will pay you.' But he refused; then he went and threw him in prison until he would pay the debt. When his fellow slaves saw what had happened, they were greatly distressed and they went and reported to their lord all that had taken place. Then his lord summoned him and said to him, 'You wicked slave! I forgave you all that debt because you pleaded with me. Should you not have had mercy on your fellow slave, as I had mercy on you?' And in anger his lord handed him over to be tortured until he would pay his entire debt. So my heavenly Father will also do to every one of you, if you do not forgive your brother or sister from your heart."
