Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 2nd Sunday of Epiphany, January 14, 2024.

Today's lessons are particularly intriguing. They get our attention and then spend time with us.

The Old Testament lesson from the First Book of Samuel (I Samuel 3:1-20) is much longer than most Sunday lessons. And intentionally so. It describes how long it took for Samuel to understand that it was God speaking to Samuel, not Eli speaking to Samuel.

Maybe I'm just speaking for myself, but this notion of faith "taking some time" to take hold is common, not rare. Very few of us, I think, jumped up from bed and turned our lives over to God. Whatever the level of our faith, the development of that faith was <u>and is</u> a process. It is not a snap of the fingers. It wasn't when Jesus first caught our attention, and it's still not a snap.

We are really intrigued, but we might be just shy of being convinced. To use the language from today's lesson, our ears tingle (I Samuel 3:11). They don't blast. The Risen Christ doesn't knock us down. No, for most of us, I suspect, the Risen Christ shook us just a little, and then a little more, and then more still, and here we are. "It is the Lord" said Eli to Samuel (I Samuel 3:20).

Today's Psalm is a conversation between the Lord and people like you and me. In verse one **(Psalm 139:1)**, we acknowledge that something is going on. "Lord, you have searched me out and known me." Just how well does the Lord know us? "You know my sitting down and my rising up; you discern my thoughts from afar."

This sense, which I suspect all of us have right now or have had previously, won't let us go. We can't get it out of our minds. Maybe we can't get it out of our souls. Is it God talking to us? Or is it our imagination? It's one or the other, isn't it. Even if we tell God to "get lost," we are acknowledging God's presence, aren't we? And it's not just a one-time session. Verse 17 of today's Psalm: "If I were to count them, they would be more in number than the sand." (Psalm 139:17)

In Paul's Letter to the Corinthians, he makes a similar point. It's an awkward point, but it's an important point. "Or do you not know that your body is a

temple of the Holy Spirit within you, which you have from God, and that you are not your own." (I Corinthians 6:15) You are free to do whatever you please, but freedom doesn't mean "anything goes."

Freedom at its best is doing what God intends for you to do, and <u>not</u> doing what God <u>doesn't</u> intend for you to do. "Anything goes" is not one of the 10 Commandments.

And now we come to today's Gospel (John 1:43). "Follow me" is the theme. That's it? Two words? One of which is a pronoun. Yes, "follow me." Not follow just anyone. No, follow God. Which means follow Jesus. A carpenter from Nazareth. God Incarnate. God in human form. A form that even you, Nathanael, can understand, if you care to. If you're ready. If you're curious. If you're frustrated.

Listen carefully. One word. Jesus. And, if you, Nathaneal, do this, "you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man." (John 1:51)

In Jesus, God, the Creator of the Universe, gives us a straight path to a fuller understanding of our lives. And the assumption of God is that "a fuller understanding of our lives" is what you and I want.

We're curious people, aren't we. We're built to ask questions, to wonder about big things, not just the little stuff. And it's why we're here. We are built to wonder, not just about where our next meal will come from, but who we are. Or, perhaps whose we are.

And, <u>as</u> we ask these really big questions, we wander all over the place. We try to consider all possibilities. We have our intellectual integrity to honor, after all. And one of the places where we settle – and we're here right now – is an institution called the Church. It's a human institution, and therefore it has its share of faults. But it's also a divine institution. It is a creation of the Holy Spirit.

It is God's appointed place for discovery, from the very beginning of things to where we are right now. Positioning ourselves to see "heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man."

Never under estimate what we do in this place and places like it, and in solitary places. We wonder, we scratch our heads, we test alternatives, we don't give in to dead-ends, we keep searching. And when we get a hint of an answer to our biggest questions, we search with even more intensity. We don't throw up our hands. Rather we fall on our knees.

In thanksgiving for a God who loves us in remarkable ways, including the birth, life, death and resurrection of Jesus of Nazareth, you and I gather. We sign up for the school bus and we go to school and we go to school some more and we keep going to school. It's our version of the discussion Jesus had with Philip: "Follow me."

And so we do. At times, our band of brothers and sisters is a rag tag group. At other times it is a consensus group, in sync on the large issues, and at some variance on the smaller ones. Can you say denominations?

And we're comfortable with a consensus identity. We like the common ground, but we don't honor the common ground to the point of dismissing our individual backgrounds. It's a potluck community in more ways than one. And we like potlucks, don't we.

And more than individual dishes, we really like community. Not to the exclusion of individual church experiences, but in gratitude for and respect for the insights and histories of others. We not only pray for one another. We learn from one another. And I'm quite certain that our exchange of backgrounds and insights strengthens us for service.

Our book of worship at St. Christopher's is the Book of Common Prayer. Towards the back of the **Prayer Book, in the section entitled "Prayers," page 827**, is a prayer "For those who influence public opinion." We don't use this prayer very often, but it really fits today, because it's about <u>all of our contributions</u>, individual and corporate. What the prayer calls simply "many voices."

Here it is, and as I read it, think of yourselves as authors of the prayer, not just listeners. And also, on this weekend, let us remember Dr. King, whose words and actions are reflected so well in this special prayer.

Almighty God, you proclaim your truth in every age by many voices: Direct, in our time, we pray, those who speak where many listen and write what many read; that they may do their part in making the heart of this people wise, its mind sound, and its will righteous; to the honor of Jesus Christ our Lord.

One last thought. Thank you for <u>your</u> voices. They make a difference. We learn and grow from one another. In Christ's Name, we pray. *Amen.*

First Reading: I Samuel 3:1-20

Now the boy Samuel was ministering to the Lord under Eli. The word of the Lord was rare in those days; visions were not widespread. At that time Eli, whose eyesight had begun to grow dim so that he could not see, was lying down in his room; the lamp of God had not yet gone out, and Samuel was lying down in the temple of the Lord, where the ark of God was. Then the Lord called, "Samuel! Samuel!" and he said, "Here I am!" and ran to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call; lie down again." So he went and lay down. The Lord called again, "Samuel!" Samuel got up; and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." But he said, "I did not call, my son; lie down again. Now Samuel did not yet know the Lord, and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. The Lord called Samuel again, a third time. And he got up; and went to Eli, and said, "Here I am, for you called me." Then Eli perceived that the Lord was calling the boy. Therefore Eli said to Samuel, "Go, lie down; and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, Lord, for your servant is listening.'" So Samuel went and lay down in his place. Now the Lord came and stood there, calling as before "Samuel! Samuel!" And Samuel said, "Speak, for your servant is listening." Then the Lord said to Samuel, "See, I am about to do something in Israel that will make both ears of anyone who hears of it tingle. On that day I will fulfill against Eli all that I have spoken concerning his house, from beginning to end. For I have told him that I am about to punish his house forever for the iniquity that he knew, because his sons were blaspheming God, and he did not restrain them. Therefore I swear to the house of Eli that the iniquity of Eli's house shall not be expiated by sacrifice of offering forever." Samuel lay there until morning; then he opened the doors of the house of the Lord. Samuel was afraid to tell the vision to Eli. But Eli called Samuel and said, "Samuel, my son." He said, "Here I am." Eli said, "What was it that he old you? Do not hide it from me. May God do so to you and more also, if you hide anything from me of all that he told you." So Samuel told him everything and hid nothing from him. Then he said,

"It is the Lord; let him do what seems good to him." As Samuel grew up, the Lord was with him and let none of his words fall to the ground. And all of Israel from Dan to Beersheba knew that Samuel was a trustworthy prophet of the Lord.
