Sermon for 4th Sunday of Epiphany, January 28, 2024

In today's Gospel reading **(Mark 1:24)**, a man <u>with an unclean spirit</u> interrupts Jesus as he, Jesus, is teaching in the synagogue. "Have you come to destroy us?" the unclean spirit asks. Jesus senses that the man is possessed, and proceeds to confront, not the man, but the unclean spirit. And, miraculously, the unclean spirit obeys Jesus, and departs. The onlookers – all of them - "are amazed."

Had you and I been there, we also would have been amazed. But why? Amazed because of troubled souls? No, there are plenty of those to go around. Amazed because of the ability of Jesus, not only to confront the evil spirit, but to send the evil spirit on its way? No, Jesus clearly had special powers, powers which you and I don't believe that we have.

Aha! That's it, isn't it? We don't think <u>we</u> can make a difference in the life of a troubled person. We don't have the training. We don't have the time. We are not God's Son. And besides, what is an evil spirit anyway? The Devil? You've got to be kidding. A red cape and horns? Be serious.

And so, we walk away from the situation. Or, we step back to make room for God to deal with the situation. After all, according to **Psalm 111**, God can do whatever God wants to do. "Great are the deeds of the Lord …. His work is full of majesty and splendor." Healing a troubled soul should be a piece of cake for God.

But, guess what? This God, who can do anything, and who many times <u>does act</u> on His or Her own, wants our help. Indeed, God expects our help. God wants us to intervene in troubling situations. That's why we are at the top of the food chain. We have the God-given ability to help. And we have the assignment to do just that.

St. Paul reminds the Corinthians **(I Corinthians 8)** that it's not enough to be assigned. We have to carry through on that assignment. And we have to believe that we indeed can do so. We have to trust that God won't expect of us anything beyond our God-given means.

Which takes us back to the man with an unclean spirit. Does God expect you and me to order the unclean spirit to leave? Doesn't God know that we don't have that kind of training, that kind of power? Please God, give us a break.

But a break from what? Surely not a break from helping someone. That's what we're supposed to do. That's what God expects to the best of <u>our</u> ability and <u>our</u> training and <u>our</u> follow-through.

Does God really expect us to cast out demons? Just like that? No, but God does expect us to do what we can, including perhaps referring people to those who are trained to help.

And guess what? Who <u>are</u> those expected to help troubled souls? Well, you and I are those people. We haven't been baptized only to observe from afar. No, we have been baptized to be Christ's representatives in challenging situations, to engage the Evil One.

Part of this assignment, this expectation, is to help according to our ability. Not try to help <u>beyond</u> our training, but certainly try to help <u>in some manner</u>. Listening, for example, is something most of us can do. Sharing experiences is another possibility. Reviewing with the person what he or she can do, and encouraging the person to tap his or her own resources. Handling physical tasks, including driving or carrying or lifting, is wide area where many of us can help.

Now, maybe listening, sharing, reviewing and handling are not <u>amazing</u> acts. But we shouldn't shortchange this possibility. Indeed, our helping hand might well be considered "amazing" by those being helped. Maybe not "amazing" to us who are trying to help, but, for those being helped, "amazing" just might be the most accurate term.

The message for us is simply that God will find a way to use our efforts, often without our awareness. Part of our belief system <u>in this setting</u> is that God uses us in ways that we might never understand. Indeed, when someone points out this possibility, <u>we</u> might well be amazed, perhaps not even remembering the occasion.

Today's Psalm suggests that God "makes marvelous works <u>to be remembered</u>." (Psalm 111:4). A reminder, not just to those being helped, but also to those, including you and me, who are the helpers. We are designed, we are created, as agents of God's love. Our baptism is our badge. And we are meant to wear that badge more often than we probably do.

Baptism and follow-through is a very special assignment from God. Remember this verse from today's lesson from **Deuteronomy**: "I will put my words in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command."

Rarely do we think of ourselves as prophets, but God certainly thinks of us as spokespeople. He considers us amazing in our potential to help others. Jesus, God's Son, helps us to recognize that responsibility.

Which leads you and me to keep this assignment front and center in <u>our</u> lives. Which leads us to church. That place, that reminder, where there is work to do on God's behalf. We have an assignment. And we have recognized that assignment. Others have the assignment, but don't recognize it and therefore need a reminder.

Welcome, fellow reminders. Both as recipients of the reminder, and as those who remind others. What we do here is a Team enterprise. Our owner is the Creator. Our general manager is Jesus of Nazareth. Those suited up to engage the enemy are all of us here. And the whole endeavor is pretty, darn exciting. I would say, maybe even AMAZING!

First Reading: Deuteronomy 18:15-20

Moses summoned all Israel and said to them, "The Lord your God will raise up for you a prophet like me from among your own people; you **shall** heed such a prophet. This is what you requested of the Lord your God at Horeb on the day of the assembly when you said: 'If I hear the voice of the Lord my God any more, or ever again see this great fire, I will die.' Then the Lord replied to me: "They are right in what they have said. I will raise up for them a prophet like you from among their own people; I will put my word in the mouth of the prophet, who shall speak to them everything that I command. Anyone who does not heed the words that the prophet shall speak in my name, I myself will hold accountable. But any prophet who speaks in the name of other gods, or who presumes to speak in my name a word that I have not commanded the prophet to speak - that prophet shall die.'"

Second Reading: I Corinthians 8:1-13

Now concerning food sacrificed to idols: we know that "all of us possess knowledge." Knowledge puffs up, but love builds up. Anyone who claims to know something does not yet have the necessary knowledge; but anyone who loves God is known by him. Hence, as to the eating of food offered to idols, we know that "no idol in the world really exists," and that "there is no God but one." Indeed, even though there may be so-called gods in heaven or on earth – as in fact there are many gods and many lords – yet for us there is one God, the Father, from whom are all thing and for whom we exist, and one Lord, Jesus Christ, through whom are all things and through whom we exist. It is not everyone, however, who has this knowledge. Since some have become so accustomed to idols until now, they still think of the food they eat as food offered to an idol; and their conscience, being weak, is defiled. "Food will not bring us close to God." We are no worse off if we do not eat, and no better off if we do. But take care that this liberty of yours does not somehow become a stumbling block to the weak. For if others see you, who possess knowledge, eating in the temple of an idol, might they not, since their conscience is weak, be encouraged to the point of eating food sacrificed to idols? So by your knowledge those weak believers for whom Christ did are destroyed. But when you thus sin against members of your family, and wound their conscience when it is weak, you sin against Christ. Therefore, if food is a cause of their falling, I will never eat meat, so that I may not cause one of them to fall.

The Word of the Lord. *Thanks be to God*.

Gospel: Mark 1:21-28

Jesus and his disciples went into Capernaum; and when the Sabbath came, he entered the synagogue and taught. They were astounded at his teaching, for he taught them as one having authority, and not as the scribes. Just then there was in their synagogue a man with an unclean spirit and he cried out, "What have you to do with us, Jesus of Nazareth? Have you come to destroy us? I know who you are, the Holy One of God." But Jesus rebuked him, saying, "Be silent, and come out of him!" And the unclean spirit, convulsing him and crying with a loud voice, came out of him. They were all amazed, and they kept on asking one another, "What is this? A new teaching – with authority! He commands and s even the unclean spirits, and they obey him." At once his fame began to spread throughout the surrounding region of Galilee.
