Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, Last Sunday of Epiphany, February 11 2024.

Today is the last Sunday in the Season of Epiphany. Its purpose is to underscore the importance of sharing the Light of the World. That would be Jesus.

By our presence in this setting, we profess two things. First, we believe that Jesus <u>is</u> the Light of the World. And second, we have the responsibility to share this Light.

The word "Epiphany" means "Insight." The "ah-ha moment." The moment when things come into focus, and we understand what our next step should be.

There are lots of those moments, aren't there? And we have been on both sides of those moments. <u>Confusion</u> and then <u>Understanding</u>. Often this process takes a long time. Indeed there are some things we still don't get. Other times, though, this process is sudden. "I get it!" Or, at least, "I think I get it."

Now, having gotten it, or gotten closer to it, what is our next step? Well, we share our experience, our understanding, especially if we believe that what we're sharing, or with whom we are sharing, can make a difference for someone else.

Which takes us to our Old Testament lesson (2 Kings 2:1-12): the relationship of Elijah and Elisha. Teacher and Student. If we were to ask Elijah, who was one of your best students? Elijah would probably identify Elisha. And if we were to ask Elisha, who was one of your best teachers, Elisha would probably identify Elijah. An academic relationship made in heaven, we might say.

That's the relationship featured in today's lesson. That relationship is underscored by Elisha's promise never to leave Elijah. "I will not leave you" repeated several times. But, as happens in these relationships, Elijah must leave.

But not without a gift for his outstanding student. A cloak, with impressive power. "When Elisha took the cloak and struck water, the water divided to the right and to the left, and he, Elisha, crossed over."

A miracle? For you and me, yes. For God, business as usual. Well, maybe not "as usual," but well within God's power.

Now, I suspect that most of us have not had this kind of experience, this intensity of Light. What Mark's gospel describes the Light as "dazzling." (Mark 9:3) Today's Psalm uses the phrase "consuming fire." (Psalm 50:3)

Our faith in God and in His Son Jesus is probably less dramatic. It's not a moment in time. It's a process over many years. And, if you have had a more dramatic experience, you probably don't share it very often. You don't want to brag. And you probably feel that others might not believe you, even if you do share a dramatic experience. The result is that you share your faith in more modest ways. Can you say St. Christopher-by-the-Sea?

Yes, this worshipping community is comfortable. There's a range of backgrounds and experiences that is broad enough to encompass all. Some might say "too comfortable." Do we lack an "edge" in sharing our faith? I don't think so. Indeed, if we have an "edge," it is a positive one. Inclusiveness rather than exclusiveness. God's love in broad strokes rather than narrow ones. A spirit of "welcome." Comfortable, but not lax.

Indeed the blend of experiences and approaches and convictions is what appeals to us. Remember Peter from today's Gospel reading. "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." (Mark 9:5) Different dwellings, different customs, different looks, but under the same roof.

Yes, it is good to be here. We contribute our experiences and we honor the experiences of others. Peter didn't say "let us make one dwelling." He said let us make three dwellings. Another way of saying, let us honor each other's experiences and perspectives. We can learn from one another. Don't shut anybody out. Indeed, it is the contributions of lots of people with different backgrounds that enhance the experience.

Remember the conclusion of our first lesson today (2 Kings 2:12). "But when Elisha could no longer see Elijah (because of Elijah's death), Elisha tore his (Elisha's) clothes in two pieces." Tearing garments was an act of respect for the departed. An acknowledgement, if you will, that there had been a special teacher-student relationship that would continue. Today's Corinthians passage uses the phrase "Let light shine out of darkness." (2 Corinthians 4:6) My guess is that our favorite teachers were those/are those who address darkness in comforting ways.

Yes, we're not speaking just of teachers we had when we were going to school. No, we have teachers right now outside of school, who impact our lives in positive ways. And, what is more to the point, you and I are teachers for others. What we value, what we hold dear, counts. People learn from us. It's a little scary, but it's true.

Life is one big classroom. And there are also sorts of possibilities in terms of how we instruct, knowingly and unknowingly, and how we learn, knowingly and unknowingly. Our goal as teachers is to be lights that shine in darkness, and our goal as students is to appreciate the light and return the light.

And one of our best lessons, if not <u>the</u> best, is an introduction to Jesus. Not in a formal way, but by how we live, how we engage the world, how we treat people. We want people to wonder where we get our hope, our faith, our commitment.

From lots of sources, of course. But also from the Lord, with the understanding that we will share that Source – capital S Source - by how we live and what we hold dear.

Here's a little exercise for us. Thinking of our faith in school terms, at what stage are we? Pre-school, kindergarten, elementary, junior high, high school, college, grad school. Or are we constantly moving between stages? And are we always a student, or are we sometimes a teacher? And, whether a student or teacher, what are people learning from us about our faith?

The big question is "Are we lights that shine in darkness?" If this community is any indication, I would say "Absolutely." Our final hymn today is "Love divine, all loves excelling." It has a wonderful phrase: "Visit us with thy salvation, enter every trembling heart." Trembling. That's what happens in this place and many other settings, public and private. And it is the "trembling" in our hearts that we then share gladly with others in all sorts of ways. We help spread the Light of Christ. What a privilege and what a joy.

First Reading: 2 Kings 2:1-12

Now when the Lord was about to take Elijah up to heaven by a whirlwind, Elijah and Elisha were on their way from Gilgal. Elijah said to Elisha, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me as far as Bethel." But Elisha said, "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they went down to Bethel. The company of prophets who were in Bethel came out to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" Elijah said to him, "Elisha, stay here; for the Lord has sent me to Jericho." But he said, "As the Lord lives and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So they came to Jericho. The company of prophets who were at Jericho drew near to Elisha, and said to him, "Do you know that today the Lord will take your master away from you?" And he answered, "Yes, I know; be silent." Then Elijah said to him, "Stay here; for the Lord has sent me to the Jordan." But he said. "As the Lord lives, and as you yourself live, I will not leave you." So the two of them went on. Fifty men of the company of prophets also went, and stood at some distance from them as they both were standing by the Jordan. Then Elijah took his mantle and rolled it up, and struck the water; the water was parted to the one side and to the other, until the two of them crossed on dry ground. When they had crossed Elijah said to Elisha, "Tell me what I may do for you, before I am taken from you." Elisha said, "Please let me inherit a double share of your spirit." He responded, "You have asked a hard thing; yet if you see me as I am being taken from you, it will be granted you; if not, it will not." As they continued walking and talking, a chariot of fire and horses of fire separated the two of them, and Elijah ascended in a whirlwind into heaven. Elisha kept watching and crying out, "Father, father! The Chariots of Israel and its horsemen!" But when he could no longer see him, he grasped his own clothes and tore them in two pieces.

Gospel: Mark 9:2-9

Jesus took with him Peter and James and John, and led them up a high mountain apart, by themselves. And he was transfigured before them, and his clothes became dazzling white, such as no one on earth could bleach them. And there appeared to them Elijah with Moses, who were talking with Jesus. Then Peter said to Jesus, "Rabbi, it is good for us to be here; let us make three dwellings, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." He did not know what to say, for they were terrified. Then a cloud over shadowed them, and from the cloud there came a voice, "This is my Son, the Beloved; listen to him!" Suddenly when they looked around, they saw no one with them any more, but only Jesus. As they were coming down the mountain, he ordered them to tell no one about what they had seen, until after the Son of Man had risen from the dead.
