Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins at St. Christopher by the Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland, 3rd Sunday of Advent, December 17, 2023.

From this morning's passage from **Isaiah**: "The Spirit of the Lord is upon me ... to bring good news to the oppressed."

Have you ever felt this way? I suspect so. You're here. We're here. Something is going on. Something is, maybe not driving us, but nudging us. And that Something just might be Someone. And that Someone just might be the Lord. God, not only speaking to us, but commissioning us. Officer Candidate School, if you will.

A nudge. A slight push. Maybe a slight pull. And maybe not so slight. Maybe with a little force behind it. Just enough, not only to get our attention, but to turn us in a particular direction. "Garland instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the mantle of praise instead of a faint spirit."

For John the Baptist, the slight push involved being a **witness to the light**. Not "light" in general, but the Light of Christ. Very specific. "Among you stands one whom you do not know, the one who is coming after me; I am not worthy to untie the thong of his sandal."

"Witness" is an interesting word. Both a noun – a witness - and a verb – to witness. We have a collection of these going, don't we? And they're not just interesting, they're compelling. "Tell me more, Isaiah." And so he does. "For as the earth brings forth its shoots, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to spring up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise to spring up before all the nations."

And guess who that "springing up righteousness and praise" might be. That's right. And here we are. Workers in God's field. Spokespeople. Representatives. Witnesses.

It's nice to be wanted, isn't it? It's an honor to represent the Lord. And it's an honor to be part of a team, a congregation, a family of witnesses to the Love of the Lord and the joy of one another's company. Church at its best. Life at its best. Freedom at its best.

Yes, Jesus does more than get our attention. He gives us work to do. And it's not easy work to do. He expects us to share his love and forgiveness, even with those who don't want to hear about such love and forgiveness. But, guess what. We don't mind this kind of hard work. Why would we want a supervisor other than the Risen Christ? It's a privilege to work, study, and share on His behalf. The Son of God, for goodness sake. From today's **Psalm**: "Those who go out weeping, carrying the seed – the Good News – will come again with joy, shouldering their sheaves."

In today's lesson from First Thessalonians **(I Thessalonians 4:23**), Paul reminds us what is in store for us if we simply accept the invitation to proclaim the Lord's love and forgiveness. "May the God of peace himself sanctify you entirely." Sanctify, not just a little bit, but "entirely."

In today's insert, there are two **canticles** as options to the Psalm. Canticles are like hymns, with content often coming from scripture. They are upbeat, as in "My soul proclaims the greatness of the Lord, my spirit rejoices in God my Savior." In a way, canticles are desert for the Lord's Supper.

People can be canticles. We can be dessert for others. We can emphasize hope in the face of sadness, beauty in the face of darkness, thanksgiving in the face of "what's the big deal." A canticle is the cherry on top. Just like "as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever."

Yes, the Risen Christ **is** a big deal. Not just past. Not just future. But present. Well worth our time and effort and sharing. That's our Story. A story delivered by a man from God whose name was John. "He came as a witness to testify to the light, so that all might believe through him. He himself was not the light, but he came to testify to the light."

This is what we do right here in this place on behalf of ourselves and all those out there. By our presence, by our helpfulness, by our hopefulness, by our trust in God's mercy, we proclaim God's Love. That proclamation is our gift to others. We receive this Good News from others, and now it's our turn to proclaim, to witness, to pass on, to model, to testify. "Raise your right hand and tell the truth." That's what we try to do right here, first with one another, and then with others.

It's a privilege, isn't it, to be called on to testify. And it's a really special gift that we can do so in a whole bunch of ways. Whatever gifts that we have as individuals can be employed in proclaiming God's love in Christ. We are not asked to fit in a mold. We are asked rather to be the mold. We are visible. We are audible. We are witnesses.

It's a privilege, isn't it, to be asked by the Lord to testify, by how we live, how we speak, how we share, how we hope, how we bounce back, how we do pretty much everything. Lest we forget, people are watching and listening. In saying yes to Jesus, we are sharing the greatest Christmas gift ever. It's an honor to testify. "Thank you, Lord, for trusting us."

Our final hymn today is "Go tell it on the mountain." One of the phrases in this hymn is "the angel chorus that hailed our Savior's birth." Well, guess who is the "angel chorus" on Gibson Island and everywhere else that you and I wander.

Stay tuned. It'll be chorus time real soon. Amen.

All this we ask through your Son Jesus Christ. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit all honor and glory is yours, Almighty Father, now and for ever. *Amen*.
