Lessons for 3rd Sunday after Epiphany – January 22, 2023

Collect

Give us grace, O Lord, to answer readily the call of our Savior Jesus Christ and proclaim to all people the good News of his salvation, that we and the whole world may perceive the glory of his marvelous works; who lives and reigns with you and the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever. *Amen.*

First Reading: Isaiah 9:1-4

There will be no gloom for those who were in anguish. In the former time he brought into contempt the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the latter time he will make glorious the way of the sea, the land beyond the Jordan, Galilee of the nations. The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who lived in a land of deep darkness – on them light has shined. You have multiplied the nation, you have increased its joy; they rejoice for you as with joy at the harvest, as people exult when dividing plunder. For the yoke of their burden, and the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor, you have broken as on the day of Midian.

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God.

Psalm 27:1, 5-13

The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom then shall I fear? *The Lord is the strength of my life; of whom then shall I be afraid?*One thing have I asked of the Lord; one thing I seek; *that I may dwell in the house of the Lord all the days of my life;*To behold the fair beauty of the Lord *and to seek him in his temple.*For in the day of trouble he shall keep me safe in his shelter; *he shall hide me in the secrecy of his dwelling and set me high upon a rock.*Even now he lifts up my head *above my enemies round about me.*Therefore I will offer in his dwelling an oblation with sounds of great gladness; *I will sing and make music to the Lord.* Hearken to my voice, O Lord, when I call; have mercy on me and answer me.
You speak in my heart and say, "Seek my face." Your face, Lord, will I seek.
Hide not your face from me, nor turn away your servant in displeasure.
You have been my helper; cast me now away; do not forsake me, O God of my salvation.

Second Reading: I Corinthians 1:10-18

Now I appeal to you, brothers and sisters, by the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, that all of you be in agreement and that here be no divisions among you, but that you be united in the same mind and the same purpose. For it has been reported to me by Chloe's people that there are quarrels among you, my brothers and sisters. What I mean is that each of you says, "I belong to Paul," or "I belong to Apollos," or "I belong to Cephas," or "I belong to Christ." Has Christ been divided? Was Paul crucified for you? Or were you baptized in the name of Paul? I thank God that I baptized none of you except Crispus and Gaius, so that no one can say that you were baptized in my name. (I did baptize also the household of Stephanas; beyond that, I do not know whether I baptized anyone else.) For Christ did not send me to baptize but to proclaim the gospel, and not with eloquent wisdom, so that the cross of Christ might not be emptied of its power. For the message about the cross is foolishness to those who perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God.

Gospel: Matthew 4:12-23

Now when Jesus heard that John had been arrested, he withdrew to Galilee. He left Nazareth and made his home in Capernaum by the sea, in the territory of Zebulun and Naphtali, so that what had been spoken through the prophet Isaiah might be fulfilled: "Land of Zebulun, land of Naphtali, on the road by the sea, across the Jordan, Galilee of the Gentiles – the people who sat in darkness have seen a great light, and for those who sat in the region and shadow of death light has dawned." From that time Jesus began to proclaim "Repent, for the kingdom

of heaven has come near." As he walked by the Sea of Galilee, he saw two brothers, Simon, who is called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea – for they were fishermen. And he said to them, "Follow me, and I will make you fish for people." Immediately they left their nets and followed him. As he went from there, he saw two other brothers, James son of Zebedee and his brother John, in the boat with their father Zebedee, mending their nets, and he called them. Immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed him. Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues sand proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people.

Sermon preached by The Rev. Charles Rowins on the 3rd Sunday of Epiphany, January 22, 2023, at St. Christopher-by-the-Sea, Gibson Island, Maryland.

So far in this Season of Epiphany we have been "coming and seeing." Today we take this journey a step farther. From today's Gospel (**Matthew 4:19**): "And then he said to them, 'Follow me, and I will make you fish for people.'"

Whoa! We've moved from "coming and seeing" to "follow me." As in "I've got a job for you."

Our response might well be "But I <u>came</u> just to <u>see</u> what the job might entail. I'm not sure I'm ready to take the job, much less 'fish for people.'"

We shouldn't be surprised by this expectation. Been to a baptism lately? Remember these questions:

Do you renounce Satan and all the spiritual forces of wickedness? Do you renounce the evil powers of this world? Do you renounce all sinful desires that draw you from the love of God? Do you turn to Jesus Christ and accept him as your Savior? Do you put your whole trust in his grace and love? Do you promise to follow and obey him as your Lord?

And do you remember this promise:

"I renounce them." Said multiple times.

Yes, we've moved from "coming and seeing" to "having arrived and doing." Including "fishing for people."

You all come and go on and off the Island many times in the course of a week. We come to the Island once a week. And what we see occasionally is probably something you take for granted.

One such activity is fishing. And often it is an adult with a child in a small boat fairly close to shore. And many of these occasions are within yards of the church.

A special time for parent and child, and by design very safe. Routine even for you and your families. But always striking when witnessed by a relative stranger. From <u>talking about</u> fishing to <u>actually catching</u> fish.

When a child feels a bite, the parent or big brother/big sister hopes that the fish is small enough for the child to reel in the fish. Small fish, but full experience. A big moment in other words. A memory for a lifetime.

As you and I continue to come and see what the church has to offer, we too gain in confidence. Confidence that, indeed, there <u>is</u> a God who, not only creates the universe, but sustains it with the help of special creatures. Who are those "special creatures"? We are those special creatures. Jesus was <u>The</u> Creature, but as baptized people, we're in the same boat, aren't we?

When we think of the Incarnation, we usually think of Big God becoming smaller. Less often do we think of the Incarnation as <u>we becoming larger</u>. As God reaches for us, we reach for God. The result is not size, but insight.

When we reach for God's Son, which allows us to accept the Son's offer, we grow in Faith by leaps and bounds. It's the theological version of feeling that nibble and then that bite.

At that point – fish on hook and reeling in – are <u>we</u> taking credit, or are we saying "Thank you, Lord"?

Well, the metaphors are getting a little carried away, aren't they? So, let's stay with the main point: "Jesus went throughout Galilee, teaching in their synagogues and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom and curing every disease and every sickness among the people." (Matthew 4:23)

Jesus did this. But – and this is the main point, this is our faith – he taught us to help, employing our particular gifts. He taught us how to fish for people. And now, by word and example, we teach others how to fish for people.

Our textbook is the Bible. But, when to engage is up to us. Through our witness, we now call to attention. God has positioned us, as a parent positions a small fishing boat, to engage the sea and its creatures.

Which can be a very challenging assignment. Not for the faint of heart. But we don't gather to complain. Rather we gather, as we do this morning, to get refreshed for the work at hand, God's work. And, at God's direction in His Son Jesus, it is our work as well. Using Isaiah's imagery, we are to help turn darkness to light by sharing burdens.

And, as we carry out this assignment, which at times, for a variety of reasons, is risky, we are strengthened by today's Psalm **(Psalm 27:7)**: "For in the day of trouble the Lord shall keep me safe in his shelter ... he will lift up my head above my enemies round about me."

And what do we see when the Lord lifts up our heads? Today's Collect refers to these blessings as "marvelous works." Marvelous, not because we are so ingenious, but because the Lord is with us. We are doing <u>the Lord's</u> work.

And happily so. In the words of Isaiah (Isaiah 9:2), "we who walked in darkness have a seen a great light."

Now, "sharing the light," teaching the young how to do likewise, and praising the Lord for both the expectation and the tools to fulfill that expectation, is our privilege and joy. We like the assignment.

When others ask us, "What is it about you and church? Why do you go? In his Letter to the Corinthians (I Corinthians 1:18), Paul shared that "the cross is foolishness to those who are perishing, but to us who are being saved it is the power of God."

There's a shorter, more familiar version: "I like to fish." No more just "coming and seeing." No more cost-benefit analysis. It's time to act" Jesus says. "Follow me!" With an exclamation mark. And, here we are. And happily and gratefully so.
